## GIVES POISON FOR CUTWORMS

State Entomologist Lovett Tells  
Method of Exterminat-  
ing Them.

The following letter is self-explan-  
atory concerning the pest which has  
been bothering many ranchers in  
this section.  
Mr. Wm. M. Black,  
Box 552,  
Marshfield, Oregon.

Dear Sir:  
Your letter of July 24th addressed to  
the Director, with accompanying  
sample of worms, has been referred  
to me for attention. These worms  
are known as the climbing cutworms,  
in case the grass should dry up they  
readily assume the army worm habit  
and travel to cultivated fields.

I find that some of them are being  
attacked by parasites. It is possible  
that the parasites will check them,  
but if you care to use poison against  
them, I would suggest the poison  
I have in hand. This is prepared as fol-  
lows:

- Bran ..... 50 lbs.
  - White arsenic or Paris green 2lb
  - Salt ..... 2lb
  - Syrup ..... 2 qt.
  - Oil of lemon ..... 2 oz.
- Mix these materials thoroughly and  
add sufficient warm water to make  
a coarse crumbly mash. Do not get  
the material sloppy; it should fall  
apart readily after pressing together  
in the hand. This material should  
be broadcast over the field in the  
early evening.
