ROSEBURG LINE VOTE OCT., 5

J. W. Perkins Says That Sentiment Is Strong—Wants Coos to Act Now.

J. W. Perkins, of Roseburg, head of the movement in Roseburg to build a line from that city to Coos Bay, arrived here last evening, having made the trip in his own auto via Myrtle Point.

Mr. Perkins states that the petitions calling the special election in Roseburg October 5 to vote \$500,000 were signed up within a very short time and the sentiment is apparently unanimous in favor of it.

The drafting of the special petitions was done very carefully, several leading attorneys being engaged to avoid possible legal errors.

The law prohibits a city from voting bonds for a subsidy for any corporation, but it can vote bonds to build a line to a given point.

Mr. Perkins said that there was nothing new in the proposed oil development work here. He said that it was being held back by inability to secure oil leases or options on sufficient land to warrant them going ahead and expending the large amount necessary to determine whether or not there is oil here.

SUGAR PRICE UP \$1 TODAY

Advance of Ten to Twenty Per Cent in Other Articles —Flour Same.

An advance of \$1.00 per hundred in sugar and a ten to twenty per cent advance in the price of olives, olive oil and imported French or Italian commodities was announced by local jobbers today. There has been no advance in the price of flour, but one is expected at almost any moment, as well as in the prices of all cereals, canned meats, etc.

F. G. Horton, manager of the Allen & Lewis company, said today that if the war continued, as it seems it must, and there appears to be an opportunity for the United States to ship most of her products, there will be a marked advance all along the line. He said that the advances announced today were but a forerunner of what might be expected.

Drugs Also Higher. F. D. Cohan of the Owl today received notice from the Langley & Michales wholesale drug firm that a material advance might be expected in the prices of all imported articles on account of the European war.

ARREST TWO FOR TROUBLE

Jack Rumpf Again in Jail for Cafe Brawl—Ruby Morris Accused Also.

Jack Rumpf was arrested last night in connection with a brawl in a small eating house on North Front street, north of Alder avenue, and spent the night in jail. Ruby Morris was arrested today for being involved in it and others may be drawn in before the matter closes.

Rumpf was recently arrested for causing a disturbance in the Palace after midnight and his wife insisted on going to jail with him. She was with him last night.

Ruby Morris, the police here claim, is the woman who caused quite a furor in Portland a few months ago by making wholesale charges of immorality and grafting against the police there.

FOREST FIRE DANGER GREAT

Starting of Bush or Slashing Fires Allowed Only by Special Permit.

W. J. Conrad, secretary of the Coos County Fire Patrol Association, stated today that the woods are becoming very dry and that the danger from forest fires is much greater than at any time during the present summer. He states that the setting of fires is prohibited from June 1st to October 1st unless a written permit is granted for such burning. These permits may be obtained from any of the fire wardens, or at the office of the Coos County Fire Patrol Association, 200 Coke Building.

A number of small fires have been reported during the past week, but no damage has been done, owing to prompt action on the part of the fire wardens employed by the Association. Mr. Conrad states that in view of the extremely dry weather there is considerable danger from forest fires and urges all campers and hunters to use the utmost caution in starting fires.

HAMLIN HEAD BANK BOARD

Boston Man Heads Federal Reserve—Regional Banks to Operate Soon.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 8.—Charles S. Hamlin of Boston has been selected for governor of the Federal Reserve Board and Frederic A. Delano of Chicago vice-governor.

The only step to take before the organization can proceed is the selection by the full reserve board of the "Class C" directors of the twelve banks. There are three of these for each bank and while there has been no formal conference as to the men to be chosen, it is generally understood that the matter has been under consideration and that the selection will not delay the formal opening long. After these directors are chosen the banks will open and organize for business.

Steamship Will Be Laid Up at Portland Two Weeks by Damaged Shaft.

Agent McGeorge received a telegram today from Portland saying that the George W. Elder had been disabled and would be unable to make the Coos Bay trip this week. Consequently the sailing from this place August 9 has been cancelled. The Elder will be out of service for two weeks, sailing from here next on August 16. While off duty she will have her thrust shaft renewed. The agents in Portland wired their regrets at their inability to maintain an uninterrupted service and also that they were unable to secure another boat to substitute for the Elder this trip.

The Arrow Line will have a boat out of Portland Wednesday, so that freight will not be badly delayed by the accident.
