

RUSSIA SENDS CITIZENS OUT

Father of Addison Parry of Marshfield Now on the Way Home.

Addison Parry of the C. A. Smith Company has received word from his father, who is in Russia when the war broke out. Parry and three other men in his party, he was sent out of Russian territory and that he is on the Pacific Mail Liner Korea, scheduled to reach San Francisco on August 21. He received word through the National Manufacturers' Association, in whose interest the party were studying labor conditions in the foreign countries.

Mr. and Mrs. Folger, who are here on an outing, Mr. Folger attending the Shrine meeting, are intensely interested in the war news, their daughter being a student in one of the German universities.

GERMANS SAY BELGIUM LOST

Claim That Belgians Suffered Heavy Losses in Battles at Liege.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 10.—A semi-official dispatch from Berlin Sunday said: "We hold fast. Liege is in our hands. The losses of the enemy are considerable. Our losses will be communicated as soon as reliably known. The transport of three to four thousand Belgian prisoners to Germany has begun. We were faced at Liege by a quarter of the total Belgian force."

EARLY REPORT OF IT.

Great Rejoicing in Berlin Over Report About Liege.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 8 (via London, 11:25 p. m.).—In Berlin there is great rejoicing over the report that Liege has fallen. The Kaiser caused the announcement to be made outside the palace.

LONDON, Aug. 9 (2:25 a. m.).—Dispatches from Brussels say that at noon Saturday communication with Liege was cut off.

"LINER CHASED.

Captain of Minnetoka Reports His Vessel Was Pursued.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—The captain of the Atlantic transport liner Minnetoka, in today from London, reported his ship had been chased by a war vessel from a point some distance east of the Nantucket lightship to nearly within sight of land.

GERMANS STOP AMERICAN SHIP

Unknown German Ship Boards American Oil Tank Steamer Near San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—An unknown German cruiser, supposed to be either the *Leipzig* or the *Nürnberg*, boarded the American oil tank steamer *Lansing*, belonging to the Union Oil Company yesterday off Cape Flattery. Word was brought to port by the British oil ship *Trinculo*, which received it from the American steamer *Whittier*, which was in wireless communication with the *Lansing*. On receipt of the news the *Trinculo*, which was outbound, immediately put back.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11.—The *Lansing* was sighted fourteen miles off the heads this afternoon. She could not have been off Cape Flattery this morning. Evidently the wireless messages exchanged between the vessels became jumbled as they were relayed here. Facts will not be available until the arrival of the *Lansing* late today.

NEUTRAL SHIPS TAKE UP TRADE

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—The Brazilian Steamship Company announced today that its fleet of seven vessels had been withdrawn from the coasting trade of South America and until further notice would ply between Brazil and New York. These ships fly the Brazilian flag. Arrangements for chartering other vessels flying neutral flags are being made to take the place of the German and British vessels withdrawn from service to South America.

DELEGATES PESSIMISTIC.

Express No Hope of Agreement with Carranza.

VERA CRUZ, Aug. 11.—General Villar and David Allend, the peace delegates representing Carranza, arrived today on their way to Mexico City. They expressed no hope of an arrangement with Carranza.

Industrial Review of the State

EVERYTHING DOING IN OREGON IN THE WAY OF PAYROLLS, FACTORIES AND ENTERPRISES EMPLOYING LABOR—MATTERS AFFECTING INDUSTRIES AND INVESTMENTS OF CAPITAL.

State Prison Superintendent Lawson is putting in a rock crushing plant near the Feeble Minded Institution to be worked with convict labor and supply material for state and county highways on a large scale.

Cooper & Hemenway erect a two-story brick at Cottage Grove.

The Dalles will install four drinking fountains.

Federal and state officials are urging a large expenditure for the extermination of rats in Oregon.

The Perry veneer plant at Bandon has resumed operations.

Oregon City will expend \$600 on fountains, feeding racks and hitching posts for horses to draw country trade.

G. D. Fell of Pendleton is building a large cleaning plant.

The Base Line Road is to be paved with Warrenite from Portland to Sandy at eighty-eight cents per square yard.

Geo. Melvin Miller will erect a \$25,000 hotel building at Florence.

Eugene Odd Fellows will erect a \$20,000 lodge building.

Contract has been let for a bank building at Mosier.

Portland water service will be extended in Irvington at a cost of \$125,000.

The Weinhardt Astoria hotel will add a fifth story.

Plans have been completed for a \$25,000 high school at Rainier.

Owing to increased labor cost and employers' liability laws, cost of sawlogs has been advanced fifty cents to one dollar per thousand.

B. M. Lombard will add two docks at Portland costing \$70,000.

Bids have been taken for a 150-foot steel bridge across the John Day River eight miles above Dayville.

Hopyards are offered twice as many pickers as heretofore so early in the season in spite of the campaign urging people not to pick hops.

W. M. Penrod will establish a ginseng industry at Mabery on Mt. Hood line.

The Corporation Department of the state government for the first year of its existence, ending July 30, produced \$310,613. Expenses were \$24,426. Commissioner Watson thinks he can handle the business hereafter for \$17,000 a year.

Eugene building permits for July totaled \$190,920, the largest for three years in any one month. Included was a \$100,000 high school.

Contract has been let for the Capital Highway in Washington County.

The Corvallis & Eastern is being rebalanced from Albany to Hoover and there is talk of extension eastward.

During the present year more than 100 new houses will go up in Corvallis.

John Shallinger of North Bend will test the state butter law that provides for only 16 and 32 ounce packages.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company has established an agricultural department in charge of H. E. Cross at Gresham.

Prof. Young of the Department of Economics of the State University has been in conference with Father O'Hara and other labor leaders to frame a program for the unemployed.

Steel rails for the Willamette Valley Southern are arriving by boat at Portland.

The Public Service Company at Tillamook is installing a 12,000-gallon oil tank.

Owing to the European war, salmon pickling at Astoria has ceased. Hops are expected to go to 50 cents as a result of the war abroad. Pendleton has immediate use for fifty new houses.

The steamer Bandon has made the fifth trip out of Toledo with 750,000 feet of lumber.
