CHILD EATS BI-CHLORIDE

Three-Year-Old Son of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Fenton Has Narrow Escape from Death.

The three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Fenton last evening accidentally swallowed several tablets of bi-chloride of mercury, but owing to prompt action by Mrs. Fenton, the child was saved from possible death by the poison.

Mrs. Fenton and child were visiting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Bradford at the time, and the little boy, in playing around the rooms, found the bottle and ate some of the contents. His mother was immediately attracted by his screams and hurrying with him in her arms to the Chandler Hotel, fortunately secured the immediate services of a physician, who used a pump to empty the boy's stomach.

Mr. Fenton was directing the concert at Second and Market streets at the time of accident, and was not aware of it until the child was through the crisis.

"DRY" ORATOR STARTS CLASH

Rev. J. G. Adams, Texas Cyclone, Insists on Speaking on the Street.

Rev. J. G. Adams, known as the "Texas Cyclone," a dry orator who is touring this section, today clashed with the Marshfield police about speaking in the street. Marshal Carter notified him that street speaking was prohibited except on Third street and the city park, but Rev. Adams could not see it that way. He insisted on speaking for a little while and gathered quite a crowd at Market and Front. Later Marshal Carter made the delivery wagon, which Rev. Adams used as a platform, move on and then Rev. Adams continued from the paving.

Rev. Samuel Gregg said that Mayor Allen informed them that there was no law against street speaking. He said that he did not see that speaking interfered any more with the streets than did the games, vendors, etc., which were in progress here a few days ago.

Finally Rev. Adams closed his talk and announced that he would speak at the Methodist church the next few nights. Just as he closed a near fight caused quite a ruction. Many of the saloon keepers protested to Marshal Carter about Rev. Adams being permitted to speak in the street.

City Attorney Goss was appealed to and it is expected that a definite ruling on the matter will be obtained.
