Small Fire Last Evening.—The fire department was called out about 7 o'clock last evening to put out a fire in the Nelson Iron Works. A defective vent caused the blaze, which was put out by the chemical apparatus after a little damage had been done.

Offices Moved.—The office of the Arrow Line has been moved to the Ocean Dock, North Front street. Agent James expects that the line will be better able to handle its increasing business in its new and larger quarters. All the boats of the company will dock there.

Child Improving.—Mr. and Mrs. George H. Taylor of Coaledo brought their little son, George, who suffered an attack of ptomaine poisoning the other day, to Marshfield yesterday for treatment. He is still in a rather critical condition, but they are now in hopes that he will recuperate soon. They have been unable to ascertain the cause of the poisoning.

Street Case Up.—Depositions of witnesses in the case of R. E. Shine, Mrs. M. E. Chapman, J. H. Flanagan and others against the city of Marshfield to prevent Curtis avenue being opened to a width of sixty feet, are being taken before Miss Annie Smith, special referee, today. S. B. Cathcart, who made the original survey for Mrs. Chapman, will give testimony today.

No More Fire Permits.—See W. J. Conrad of the Coos county Fire Patrol announces that no more fire permits for burning brush or slashings will be issued until rain reduces the danger of forest fires. These permits are required during the summer season and parties starting brush or slashings fires without them are subject to a severe penalty. The idea is to enable the fire patrol to keep close tab on the fires so that fire wardens can be on guard in case a fire should get away and threaten the forests.

Makes Fast Trip.—Miss Ruth Allen, daughter of Mayor P. E. Allen, left this morning for Albany, via Allegany and Scottsburg. She was to have gone with a party of returning Shriners on the steamer Alert to Allegany, but missed the sailing of the boat by about thirty minutes. She then boarded the speed boat Pronto and made a flying trip up Coos River in pursuit of the Alert, hoping to catch up with her friends before they reached Allegany. Miss Allen will spend a month or so with friends and relatives in Albany and Lebanon.

Cannot Settle.—Henry Sengstacken and Mayor Allen have thus far been unable to effect any terms on which the claims for damages from overflow during the dredge operations in West Marshfield can be adjusted. The property owners West of Tenth street refuse to turn in any bill unless assured that their claim will be paid without litigation and the representatives of the city and Port Commission do not wish to be bound by any agreement until they can pass on the reasonableness of the claims. It seems that the property owners figure that if they have to begin suit to collect damages they will claim a larger amount than they will if they settle without litigation. However, if they present their reduced claim to the city and Port for payment, it might be used as evidence in the suit and knock out their greater claims. In consequence it seems dubious as to a settlement being effected outside of court. The suit which the land owners have started to compel someone to keep open the drainage to West Marshfield will determine whether the city or port is responsible for damages and it is expected that then the suit will be started.

NO DETAILS OF DROWNING

Details of the circumstances of the drowning of Miss Vera Harry and Miss May Willis at Brewster Valley were impossible to secure today, other than that the two girls, with a younger brother of Miss Harry, were bathing in a quiet pool when Miss Willis ventured out beyond her depth and her strength gave out. Miss Harry immediately went to the aid of her friend and in the struggle to come ashore both girls were drowned. The little boy gave the alarm at once but the bodies were not recovered until two hours later, when all hope of resuscitating them was past. Miss Harry is the daughter of E. N. Harry, a prominent rancher of Brewster Valley and both were prominent members of the community.
