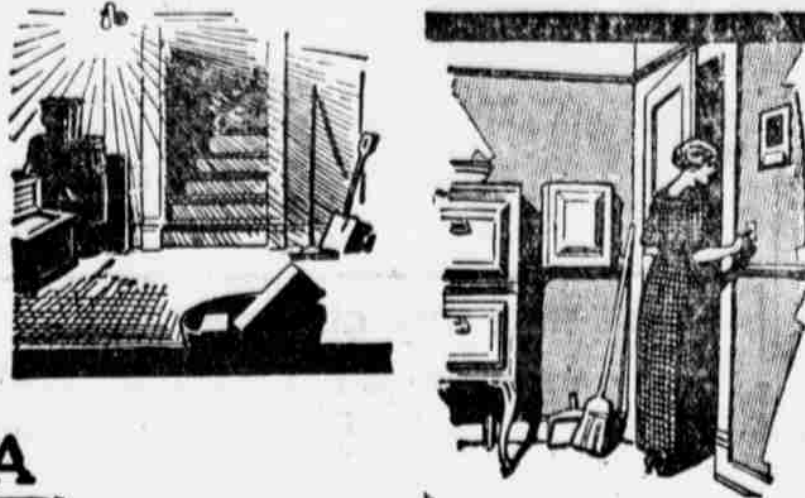

### SUMMARY OF 1910

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15.—According to the Report on Occupations recently issued by Director William J. Harris, of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, there were 305,164 persons 10 years of age and over in Oregon in 1910 engaged in gainful occupations. The gainful workers thus formed 45.4 per cent of the total population of the state (672,765) and 54.9 per cent of the population 10 years of age and over (555,631). In 1900 the 169,637 gainful workers of the state formed 41 per cent of the total population and 51.6 per cent of the population 10 years of age and over.

The male gainful workers in 1910 numbered 264,691, or 81.5 per cent of all males 10 years of age and over, as compared with 151,200, or 79.6 per cent, in 1900. The female gainful workers in 1910 numbered 40,473, or 17.5 per cent of all females 10 years of age and over, as compared with 18,437, or 13.3 per cent, in 1900.

**Distribution of Workers.**  
The 305,164 gainful workers in 1910 were distributed among the main branches of occupations as follows: Agriculture, forestry and animal husbandry, 88,114, or 28.9 per cent; extraction of minerals, 3,671, or 1.2 per cent; manufacturing and mechanical industries, 82,098, or 26.9 per cent; transportation, 35,021, or 11.5 per cent; public service, 3,764, or 1.2 per cent; professional service, 17,370, or 5.7 per cent; domestic and personal service, 27,307, or 8.9 per cent; and clerical occupations, 13,433, or 4.4 per cent.

**Sex of Workers.**  
Of the gainful workers in 1910, 264,691, or 86.7 per cent, were males and 40,473, or 13.3 per cent, females. In agriculture, forestry and animal husbandry the males numbered 85,472, or 97 per cent, and the females 2,642, or 3 per cent. Practically all—3,677, or 99.9 per cent—of the persons engaged in the extraction of minerals were males. In manufacturing and mechanical industries 75,372, or 91.8 per cent, of the workers were males and 6,726, or 8.2 per cent, females. Males constituted 97.2 per cent of the 35,021 persons engaged in transportation, 88.5 per cent of the 34,386 persons engaged in trade, and 95.3 per cent of the 3,764 persons engaged in public service. In professional service 10,264, or 59.1 per cent, of the workers were males and 7,106, or 40.9 per cent, females, a large proportion of the females being school teachers. Domestic and personal service was the only large field of occupations in which the females outnumbered the males. Here females numbered 13,817, or 50.6 per cent, and males only 13,490, or 49.4 per cent, of the workers. Of the persons pursuing clerical occupations, 8,394, or 62.5 per cent, were males and 5,039, or 37.5 per cent, females.

**Color or Race of Workers.**  
Of the 264,691 gainfully occupied males in 1910, 145,278 were native whites of native parentage, 44,733 native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 62,897 foreign-born whites, 810 negroes, and 10,973 other colored. The proportion which the gainfully occupied males formed of all the males 10 years of age and over in each principal class of the population was: For native whites of native parentage, 78.4 per cent; for native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 77.6 per cent; for foreign-born whites, 91.7 per cent; and for negroes, 96.7 per cent.

Of the 40,473 gainfully occupied females in 1910, 24,102 were native whites of native parentage, 10,281 native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 5,628 foreign-born whites, 230 negroes and 230 other colored. The proportion which the gainfully occupied females formed of all the females 10 years of age and over in each principal class of the population was: For native whites of native parentage, 16.5 per cent; for native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 20.7 per cent; for foreign-born whites, 17.5 per cent; and for negroes, 44.1 per cent.

**Age of Workers.**  
The gainfully occupied males in 1910 were distributed according to age periods as follows: 10 to 13 years, 891; 14 to 15 years, 2,169; 16 to 20 years, 23,663; 21 to 44 years, and age unknown, 164,772; 45 years and over, 73,286. The proportion which the gainfully occupied males formed of all males in each age period was: For those 10 to 13 years of age, 3.6 per cent; for those 14 to 15 years of age, 18.8 per cent; for those 16 to 20 years of age, 70.5 per cent; for those 21 to 44 years of age, 96.5 per cent—that is all but 4 men in every 100 had gainful occupations; and for those 45 years of age and over, 84.8 per cent.

The gainfully occupied females in 1910 were distributed according to age periods as follows: 10 to 13 years, 129; 14 to 15 years, 406; 16 to 20 years, 8,206; 21 to 44 years, and age unknown, 25,478; and 45 years and over, 6,254. The proportion which the gainfully occupied females formed of all females in each age period was: For those 10 to 13 years, 0.6 per cent; for those 14 to 15 years, 3.6 per cent; for those 16 to 20 years, 27.5 per cent; for those 21 to 44 years of age, 22.3 per cent; for those 45 years of age and over, 11.6 per cent.

**Number of Children at Work.**  
In Oregon in 1910 there were 2,970 males and 535 females 10 to 15 years of age engaged in gainful occupations; or, stated otherwise, 8.7 per cent of the males and 1.6 per cent of the females 10 to 15 years of age were gainful workers. In 1900 there were 2,331 males and 521 females 10 to 15 years of age engaged in gainful occupations, which was 9.2 per cent of all males and 2.2 per cent of all females 10 to 15 years of age.
