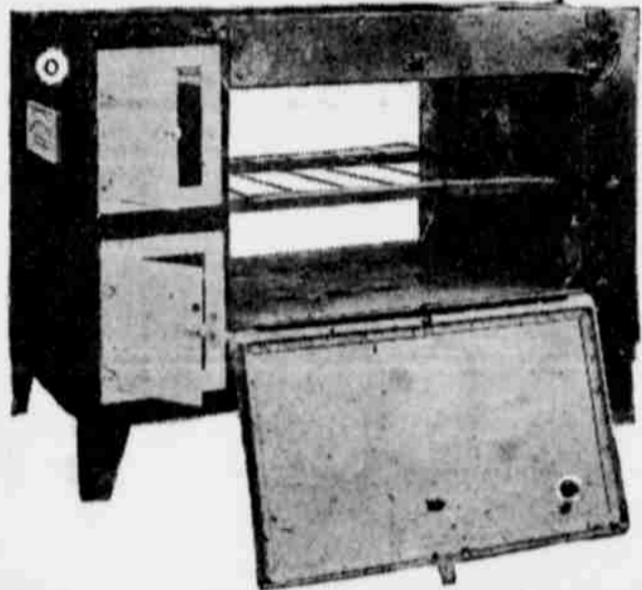

### CALIFORNIA CHURCH BUILT LIKE A BUNGALOW.

A CHURCH edifice, which has so little resemblance to the familiar house of worship that the average man would mistake it for a private home, has been built in Los Angeles. This church harmonizes well with its environment, having many of the features that make Los Angeles bungalows so attractive to visitors," says the July Popular Mechanics Magazine, in an illustrated article. "The broad veranda with its easy chairs at the entrance, the rose-covered pergola leading to the door, the grounds with palms and flowers—all these make the church inviting to people who are not attracted by the formality of the more conventional sacred architecture. Within, the customary rows of pews are lacking, while a massive fireplace, such as forms the heart of a home, is in the auditorium. The chairs in the auditorium may be set to face the pulpit, or they can be turned toward the small stage at one side, which is used for concerts or other entertainments."

### COUNTY SCHOOL NEWS.

#### New Buildings, New Teachers and Other Changes.

The people of Myrtle Creek are grading their school grounds, putting in a new water system and making other improvements, at an expense of \$400, and will probably succeed in their purpose to put their school in the "A Standard" class. It has also been decided to have a winter school instead of a summer one as heretofore, and C. E. Waterman has been engaged as teacher.

Lampa District will also have a winter school instead of a summer one; and this is a change which seems to be in general favor. There they are to have a seven-months' term and J. Beddingfield will teach.

The Teachers' Institute for Coos county will be held at Myrtle Point week after next, running from August 24 to 29.

Superintendent Baker is going over to Beaver Hill the last of this week to decide between the two sites offered for the fine new school building that Harry Clouser is going to erect there this fall.—Coquille Sentinel.

### S. P. MAKES CHANGE IN PORTLAND OFFICE

Purchases Large Amount of Supplies for the W. P. Railway.

PORTLAND, Ore. Aug. 14.—As a part of general retrenchment policy the office of purchasing agent of the Southern Pacific will be abolished here, and Purchasing Agent A. E. Hutchinson will probably be transferred to the general headquarters at San Francisco. The change is effective August 15. While the office does a business of about \$125,000 a month, the abolishment of the department here will have little effect on the volume of goods brought here. The bulk of purchases in this territory is of timber and manufactured lumber products and commissary supplies for the construction forces on the Willamette Pacific line being built from Eugene to Coos Bay. As heretofore the requisitions for these supplies will go through the general store here and be purchased in local markets.
