

RUMOR OF RECALL OF MAYOR ALLEN STARTED ON STREET TODAY

Said That Efforts Are Being Made to Force Removal of Police by Threatening Mayor—No Sponsor for Movement Can Be Found.

Rumors have been current on the streets since Saturday night that an effort will be made to recall Mayor Allen unless the Mayor discharges the entire present police force. No one can be found who is at the head of the movement, and it very probably will result in no action being taken against the officials.

From what can be learned, the first move was made some time during the middle of last week, when J. C. Epperson and Chas. McCay, both local men, approached Attorney C. L. Kengard, asking about the legal procedure in such a step. By advice of Mr. Kengard the matter was delayed and later dropped, as far as Mr. Epperson was concerned. He stated that he could find no supporting sentiment among the citizens and that he did not care to proceed.

The affair seems to be an outgrowth of the recent street-speaking affair, during which Rev. Adams held forth for three consecutive afternoons in advocating the anti-House campaign. Other explanations are that disclosures of unorthodox in police circles brought out the rumor. It is known that the motive for wishing the police discharged, but the risk of Mr. Epperson and Mr. McCay to Attorney Kengard occurred a day or so previous to the trial, and before the disclosures had been made public.

It seems that whatever is back of the move is trying to remove the police, and that no objections are made to the administration of Mayor Allen, but by threatening to recall him to force the removal of the officers. Just what individuals or factions are behind the scheme, it is impossible to determine, the "wet" and "dry" elements both being on the edge of it. W. W. Barnes, of the Northwest Saloon, emphatically denies that he had heard anything of it, and that the saloon men are positively not responsible, and that he personally would do all in his power to prevent the recall.

The Memorial Association likewise denies all knowledge of the affair, and they, too, will oppose any move affecting the Mayor. There are some of them, however, who are the agents now of recalling the Mayor because Mayor Allen permitted the Protestant speaker to use the streets to spread their creed.

In the matter of allowing the street speaking, the Mayor and police were divided in opinion, the Mayor holding that no ordinance prohibited the use of the streets, and the police commanding that if the prohibition were allowed to speak on the streets. It is a short time the streets would be covered with W. W. speakers and captains of various kinds.

Mayor Allen, when interviewed, stated that of course he had heard the street rumors, but paid no attention to them. He stated that he was supporting the movement, but was supporting the movement, but for what purpose and at whose behest he was not informed.

None of the City Councilmen had heard anything definite in the matter, several of them expressing great surprise when it was called to their attention.

The story was reported here by Frank Dennis, news editor of the Bandon Call, but at that time was running the City Cafe in Springfield. Dennis says that Rev. Adams made exceedingly raucous remarks concerning the views of saloon men and bartenders and their associates, which evidently was taken to concern liquor men, and that in a corner where followed there, Rev. Adams was received by the police, and the pastor flushed red.

The first telegram was sent by Rev. Kengard to the Mayor of Springfield asking for information of the attack. It was worded as follows: "There was no violence thrown at Adams, the temperance street speaker when he spoke in your city a year ago." Were reply immediately as follows:

"The second telegram was in return and was to the effect: "No such circumstances were known to Adams during same year excepting a year ago in our city." Chas. L. Scott, Mayor."

The meeting last night was opened standing room being at a premium.

TRY TO HOLD UP AUTO PARTY HERE TONIGHT

North Bend Men Have Thrilling Experience Near Empire Saturday Night.

A thrilling scene of another attempted holdup on the North Bend-Empire road about 1 o'clock Sunday morning is told by Lee Head, a North Bend auto driver and a party of well known North Bend men. However, by turning on full speed, the party got away after being ordered to halt, but a bullet hole in the body of the car and another bullet mark on the front-guard are signs of the twelve shots which they state the holdup artists fired at them.

There were three men in the holdup gang and it is believed that some of them were in the gang that held four or five men a few months ago on the same road just west of North Bend. No positive clue has been obtained yet.

Those in the cars were Devere Lee, Henry, Joe Gaffey, Robert Kehoe, Jeff Hartman, C. C. Davis, Will Schuck and Frank Stumba. It was reported that Nevers, Derbyshire and Tamm were in the party but today it was stated that they were not.

The auto occurred as he turned the old corner just a short distance east of Empire. The party was spinning along at a good clip when the men appeared alongside and ordered them to stop. The car stalled and when heads were ordered up, all thought it was a joke and some of them urged Head to speed ahead. He did so and a volley of shots followed. Some claim that twenty or fifteen shots were fired. Two of the men were on one side of the road and the third was on the opposite side.

When the party reached Empire, they found that the telephone line at North Bend had been cut. They think that this must have been done by the holdup men. The party had considerable cash, jewelry and other valuables with them so that if the attempt had succeeded, the robbers would have made a good haul.

However, it is believed that the holdup gang means because they would not have attempted to run away from them. None of the party was armed.

MAIL SITUATION GETS SERIOUS

Postoffice Department Refuses to Let Contract for Marshfield Mail.

The following communiqués received today from Representative Sawyer are well known and would indicate that the situation is growing serious.

With reference to correspondence between me and Senator Sawyer concerning the proposed contract for the delivery of the mail between the cities of Coos Bay and North Bend, I beg to advise you that no satisfactory proposal was submitted in response to the advertisements for service between the points mentioned, and therefore, in view of contract having been made with the post office at Coos Bay, it is believed that no change in these rates, however, in connection with the establishment of through service between the post offices in question, should be made.

Proposals were issued by several cities, including Coos Bay, North Bend, and the surrounding towns.

These proposals were submitted to the post office department for consideration.
