WILSON WOULD AID SHIPPING

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—President Wilson is seeking a way to build up the American merchant marine on a permanent basis, he told callers at the White House. He said he was not certain that legislation on this subject now pending in Congress will accomplish this end, but declared that he earnestly hoped such a result might be brought about. He expects to investigate the subject thoroughly in the near future in order to act intelligently in aiding Congress to pass the best bill possible.

Serious Charges Made Against Government Officials in Seattle by Witnesses.
