The 1914 state wool clip totaled \$2,700,000.

The Blue Sky Law is being attacked in a new suit by W. B. McKinney of Portland on the ground of depriving the citizens of property without due process of law and delegates arbitrary power to the commissioner.

The Freeland Furniture and Elcar Desk Co. of Portland have united.

Enterprise opens bids Aug. 25 for a \$20,000 sewer system.

Molalla high school will be completed Sept. 1, and a new water system is being installed.

The new cannery at Gresham will be located in Mildred addition.

Coquille is selling \$30,000 bonds for water plant improvements.

A new wharf is to be erected at Fort Stevens.

The new S. P. and S. docks will be built at the foot of Madison street Portland.

The Orenco Co-operative Marketing association will build a warehouse.

Rev. O'Hara, Prof. Young of U. of O. and others met at Portland and created a committee to form a program for the unemployed.

The S. P. Company purchasing office that disbursed \$200,000 a month for supplies has been removed to San Francisco as a measure of economy.

Three miles of water main will be laid on the Portland peninsula.

Portland commissioners have authorized sale of \$150,000 dock bonds. The Jensen Creamery Co. at Richland, Baker County, will have a cheese factory in operation by March 1st.

A \$2,000 bridge is to go in at Oak Ridge across the Willamette.

Lane county officials are planning a road from Coburg north to cost \$20,000.

Bridge street, South Baker, has been ordered improved.

City barns will be built at Portland to cost \$50,000.

A four foot sewer will be laid through Fairmount addition, Eugene.

Albany business men are trying to raise \$7500 to enlarge furniture plant.

An extension of the P. E. & E. Ry. at Eugene will tap 3515 acres.

The Salem Falls City & Western railroad will be extended three miles up Teal creek.

The Gold Ridge Mines Co. of Seattle has bought 300 acres of gold placer land on Josephine creek and will put in a large dredger plant.

A freak law that will be proposed in the legislature is to create the office of county advisor.

The Oregon City paper industry is not effected by the foreign war.

Forestry officials and Lincoln county will build a road out of Waldport.

Klamath Falls people think the Oregon-California Power Co. is making too much money and the Oregon Railroad commission will investigate.

Thirty new houses are being built at Forest Grove and ten blocks of paving.

Dry Goods Co., has been in the city a few days on business in connection with the company here.

Twelve new members were initiated into the local Rebekah Lodge last Tuesday night and two were taken in by transfer. Mrs. Kate Lando, state president, was present at the session. Refreshments were served after the initiatory work was completed.

Dr. C. S. Endicott expects to start tomorrow on a hunting expedition to the Rogue River. He will be accompanied by his brother, Dr. S. C. Endicott, of Coquille, Stewart Lyons, of Marshfield, and Mr. Larson of Los Angeles.

RAILWAY NEWS OF SIUSLAW

Interesting Items of W. P. Advances From the Pilot.

The bridge at the fourth crossing of the Siuslaw river is now being swung, a 60 foot girder having been placed. This leaves one 250 foot span and a 100 foot span to be swung at this crossing.

Three more large bridges must be erected before reaching Mapleton. They are at the fifth and sixth crossings of the Siuslaw river and at Lake creek. At the fifth crossing a 200 foot pin connection span will carry the rails across, while at the sixth crossing two spans, one to be 150 feet in length and the other 100 feet, with a 60 foot girder, will be used.

Lake creek will be crossed with one span of 150 feet long.

The rails are now to the fourth crossing, and ballasting of the road-bed continues. This is fourteen miles above Mapleton.

It is expected that by the first of next week train service will be extended to Richardson's.

The pile driver and crew are now on this side of Lake creek, having crossed Wednesday.

From there to Mapleton are only a few small crossings where piling will have to be driven, and this work will soon be completed to Mapleton.
