The institute will be conducted on the summer school plan and the same instructors as last year will have charge of the program of work. Miss Ruby Shearer, supervisor of primary work in the Portland schools, will conduct the primary department. Mr. Gentle, of the State Normal at Monmouth, will have charge of the intermediate department and Mr. Kirk of the same institution will conduct the High School department. 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BANDON LETS BIG CONTRACT

\$12,000 Paving and \$1500 Sewer Improvements Arranged for.

(Special to The Times.)
BANDON, Or., Aug. 20.—The City Council last night let contracts for paving, sewer and sidewalk that will aggregate about \$14,000. The contracts were secured by the Longstone Construction Co., of Coquille.

The paving is to be 6 3/4 inch concrete and will extend three blocks from the bank to the city hall. The bid of the Longstone Company was \$1.68 per square yard. The Bandon Construction Company bid \$1.75.

The sewer contract was let at \$0.80 per square yard for excavation, \$75 for manholes and \$125 for flush tanks. This was also secured by the Longstone Company. The work will be commenced at once.
