

ACCIDENTS IN COOS COUNTY

Only Ten Reported to State Labor Commissioner Last Week.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 20.—Seventy-one accidents, one fatal, were reported to Labor Commissioner Hoff during the week. The fatal accident occurred at North Bend where J. T. Johnson met death while engaged in logging. Railroad work proved the most hazardous, twenty-one persons sustaining injuries in that employment. The following is the list of injuries reported from Coos county: H. Swartz, Marshfield, ankle sprained, blacksmith. H. Galbraith, Marshfield, back injured, lumber yard. D. B. Otis, Marshfield, back sprained, sawmill. J. T. Johnson, North Bend, fatal, logging. J. Cobble, Marshfield, leg and foot injured, logging. Gust Panik, Marshfield, finger torn, lumber yard. A. Mellon, North Bend, body bruised, planing mill. Tony J. Hannas, North Bend, thumb lost, box factory. Alton Ross, Marshfield, side bruised, logging. E. L. White, Marshfield, side bruised, lumber yard.

COMMENT ON COOLEY TRIAL

Noted Case Is Cause of Much Speculation in Many Quarters.

The Cooley case, which is the principal one to be tried at the present term of the Curry County court, is creating much comment and promises to be a hardy fought on both sides. Attorney W. W. Cardwell, who is attorney for the defense, says he will be able to show that Cooley is innocent of the crime charged and he has no fear of conviction. District Attorney Brown of Roseburg will probably be called into the case, although this is not certain. A recent Salem press dispatch says: "Stating that a number of recent newspaper dispatches had carried the statement that Stephen Doyle, a Spokane detective, who arrested Aaron Cooley in San Francisco several months ago for a murder alleged to have been committed in Curry County twelve years ago, was a special agent of the executive's office, Governor West said that the man was not in any way connected with his office. Doyle, he stated, gathered the evidence in the case and arrested Cooley independently of the Governor's office, and all the latter had to do with it was to name Doyle as agent to bring Cooley back to this state."
