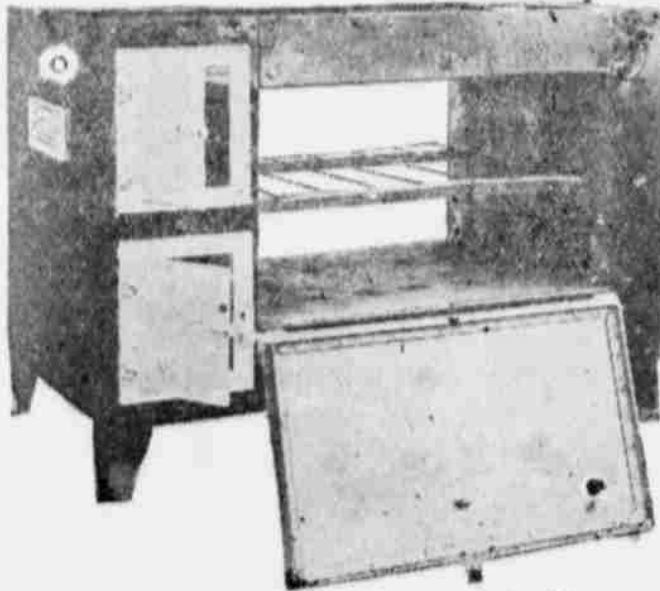

There will be two divisions of the Eighth Grade—one preparing for the February state examinations and the other for the June state examinations. The grade will be taught by Miss Mary V. Haley and Miss Marie T. Mahoney.

School Notes.
The manual training shop has been further equipped during the summer by the addition of three speed lathes and a band jointer. The lathes make possible the training in wood turning and pattern making which is outlined in the course for the second year, in wood working. Mr. Fred Flanders, who comes with three years experience at Ashland and Oshkosh, Wis., will have charge of the work.

During the summer a cabinet for large bins for flour and sugar has been placed in the kitchen and a ninety-drawer locker placed in the sewing room. The experiment of serving lunch at cost to students will be tried out this year. A test of the labor required, cost per lunch, and demand for same has been desired for some time. Miss Elizabeth Mary Moore, instructor in charge for the past two years will direct this work.

The June elections of science were large, especially in chemistry, in which over thirty students enrolled. Courses are offered in Physics, Chemistry, Physicist Geography, and other Botany or Zoology. The laboratories are equipped for strong courses in the above studies. The instructor in this department is Mr. A. J. M. Robertson, a teacher of experience in science work.

The English work, which includes Dramatics and Debating will be taught by Miss Esther Silverman, instructor in charge for the past three years, and Mr. Arthur L. Silverman, who comes to us with an enviable record in the University of California for scholarship and culture. It is a satisfaction to know that the strong work in the English department is to be continued.

The essentials for office work are accuracy in figures, spelling and grammar, and accuracy plus rapidity in note-taking and typing. There is no mysticism about it—nothing but work with a big "W." You can work at home without cost or work elsewhere and pay your money. That is about the situation in a nutshell. Eighth grade graduates may be admitted to this department. An exchange of typewriters was made during the summer so the department begins the year with new machines. The instructor in this work is Miss Frances Harkness.

Mr. Roy E. Waite, principal of the High School, is a teacher of experience in rural, village and city schools. His Normal course and University training were taken at intervals between his teaching after he had earned the money to take them. His career as a teacher has been a gradual rise to better things. Wherever Mr. Waite has taught he has always made many friends and endeared himself to the community. Mr. Waite has an asset to his teaching in that he is a singer of some ability and a cornetist with experience in conducting a high school orchestra. Mr. and Mrs. Waite will reach Marshfield about September 1st.

Mr. Royal F. Niles is so well known in the northwest for his athletic ability that little need be said about that. He has first rate ability as a baseball and basketball player and for three years was given the position of half-back on the all-northwest football team. He graduated from Whitman, where he specialized in History and was a strong student in that subject. With all his interests Mr. Niles has found time to interest himself in Bible School work, having taught boys in a mission school for the past two years.

Four Latin work in Latin and two in German are offered in the High School at present. The work will be in charge of Miss Ethel A. Reese, instructor in charge for the past year.
