

MEDFORD, Aug. 25 .- One of the strangest monuments that ever marked the grave of a man will be finished this week by F. W. Waine of this city. It is a fulfillment of a clause in the will of William Hartley. the eccentric Coos Bay bachelor who died at Marshfield last winter. The monument is intended by Hartley to be his parting rebuke to women.

Inscribed upon the monument are these words:

'To the memory of a good-looking independent bachelor, who early in life refused to eb bossed by a petti-coat and perhaps eternally." Above is a sketch of the Styx River.
