Fine Launch Trip.—Cecil Holland, John Wall, John Ross and a few others returned yesterday in the launch Standard from Newport, Or., where they went on an outing. They had a fine trip going and coming and enjoyed some deep-sea fishing.

Asks Divorce.—Mrs. Anona Umstadt is now suing for a divorce from J. W. Umstadt on the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. This may terminate the criminal prosecution of Umstadt on the charges filed against him by his wife in Justice Penneck's court.

Finds Overcoat.—James Coke of Honolulu, while visiting here recently, lost his overcoat. He searched in vain and finally tried a Times want ad. GETTING A DRASTIC ORDINANCE READY
 City Attorney Liljeqvist tells us he is getting near the end of the work he has been engaged in for some time on that drastic liquor ordinance. The question was how near he could come to absolutely preventing the bringing of booze into dry territory like Coquille. He says, after going over a vast number of decisions, he has found one by the United States Supreme Court that fits the case exactly; and now feels assured he will be able to make the ordinance horse high, pig tight and bull strong. All that will then remain will be to see that it is enforced, and our Mayor and Councilmen can be depended upon to hew to the line there.—Coquille Sentinel.
