GARDINER GLEANINGS.

News of the Umpqua Section, Taken from the Courier.

The first of the week has been somewhat cooler than usual and quite foggy. Sixty-one days having passed Tuesday of this week without rain, this being unusual for this section of the country, even the fog which has prevailed part of the time being high and dry. Feed has dried up, causing quite a shrinkage of butter fat from the dairy farms.

Work is progressing beyond the slide in the north portal of tunnel 6, which occurred last February. In the south portal of this tunnel the work is going on at the rate of six feet per day. Should everything go well this tunnel should be finished by Christmas. The work on Jack France slough except in a few places is covered by station men and should the rains hold off until November the grading will be completed.
