COURT CASES ARE TAKEN UP

Judge Coke Hears Arguments in Several Actions—Cobb Divorce Is Granted

Although the adjourned term of circuit court will not be convened at Coquille until a week from today, Judge Coke is cleaning up a number of matters at hearings in chambers here. Yesterday four cases were taken up by him. The adjourned term of court will be followed by the regular September term, which opens September 14. There will be a rather heavy calendar, but not so much important criminal business as last term.

Yesterday Lorna Doon Cobb was granted a divorce from Joseph D. Cobb. They were married in Roseburg in 1910 and the mother was given the custody of the little son. The case was not contested.

The action of Hillstrom and others against the City of Marshfield for a preliminary injunction relative to the drainage of the dredge filled area was argued yesterday and Judge Coke will announce his decision later.

The injunction case of T. H. Barry vs. the City of Marshfield, involving the assessment on North Eighth, was argued. The injunction prohibiting the collection of the assessment was continued, but not against the completion of the street improvement. Judge Coke will announce his decision later.

The case of J. M. Foulkes vs. Henry Sengstacken and others, involving a tract of land near the mouth of Catching Inlet which Foulkes' mother sold shortly prior to her death, was referred to A. D. Loud as special referee to take the testimony by September 14.
