Delay Opening Mill.—Mr. Houck, who with Mr. Samuels and others, purchased the old Courtney mill on Isthmus Inlet, has stated that the opening of it will be indefinite. Mr. Houck is now interested in a colonization scheme in Texas and did not have the \$10,000 ready cash necessary to start the mill and he decided it was a poor time to try and float a stock company for it.

Ready to Fight.—F. Athren, who arrived here Sunday from San Francisco to seek work as a blacksmith in the camps, says that he tried to join the Lelpalg, the German cruiser, at San Francisco when she was there a few weeks ago, but the U. S. officials would not permit it. About 1000 other Germans tried to do likewise. Athren served on the German cruiser Lothringen for four years as a gunner. He offered the German consul at San Francisco to go back, but the latter could not find the means to send him. Athren has four brothers in the war and is anxious to go back and fight for his country. His home is at Berlin.
