Notice is hereby given that at the School District Bond Election hereby called to be held at the Central School Building, in and for School District No. 9, of Coos County, Oregon, the 10th day of September, A. D. 1914, between the hours of two o'clock p. m. and seven o'clock p. m., there will be submitted to the legal voters thereof the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS, for the purpose of constructing a building and Gymnasium for School purposes in and for said School District, said Building and Gymnasium to be constructed on School grounds now owned by said School District No. 9, Coos County, Oregon, adjoining the High School Building and between South 10th Street and South 7th Street, and between Golden Avenue West and Ingersoll Avenue West, in the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon.

The vote to be by ballot, upon which shall be the words "Bonds—Yes" and "Bonds—No," and the voter shall place a (X) between the word "Bonds" and the word "Yes," or between the word "Bonds" and the word "No," which indicates his choice.

FURNISH COAL FOR ENGLISH

German Ambassador Complains About Violation of Neutrality at New York

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Count Von Bernstorff, the German ambassador to the United States, announced today that he had positive information that two British cruisers lying ten miles from New York harbor had received supplies of coal, provisions and ammunition from a vessel flying the American flag.

AGREE ON WIRELESS RULES
WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 5.—many has virtually accepted the plan of the United States for the enforcement of neutrality over wireless communication to belligerent countries.

The plan permits the German embassy, as well as the diplomatic representatives of all other belligerent nations to send code messages by wireless, but American naval officers at all stations must be taken into the confidence of the senders to establish the neutral nature of communications.

Germany was the leading protestant against the present arrangement, claiming that while her cables had been severed, Great Britain continued unrestricted cable communication from the United States. The American government at first planned to censor the cables, but abandoned the idea not only because of legal difficulties, but other insurmountable obstacles, deciding to equalize the situation by enabling Germany to secure some other satisfactory means of communication with her embassy here.

The wireless station at Sayville, L. I., is the only one which can reach Germany from here.
