MAIL SERVICE HARD PROBLEM

New Bids Asked for Myrtle Point Route—May be for Only One Year

WORLD'S GREATEST WAR DAY BY DAY

ENGLANDS POPULACE IN HOURLY TERROR OF GERMAN ZEPPELINS

LONDON, Sept. 7.—Whether the danger is real or fancied and despite official assurances calculated to put the public mind at rest, the populace of England, especially rural districts, are living in hourly terror of an attack by Germans from the air.

Villages in several instances have mounted obsolete cannon, taken by the British in former war, and till now decorating cemeteries, public squares and the like, loaded them and trained them skyward to fire on any of the enemy's aircraft which might put in an appearance.

PROCLAMATION IS ISSUED ON DEPARTURE FROM PARIS

French Government Issues Another Direct Appeal to the People of France

"ENDURE AND FIGHT" ARE THE WATCHWORDS OF WAR

Removal is Made to Permit the Military Authorities to Have Full Sway

PARIS, Sept. 7.—The following is an official copy of the proclamation issued by the government announcing the temporary transfer of the capital to Bordeaux:

ENDURE AND FIGHT

"Frenchmen: For several weeks our heroic troops have been engaged in fierce combats with the enemy. The courage of our soldiers has won for them a number of marked advantages. But in the north the pressure of the German forces has constrained us to retire.

Paris without having assured a defense of the city and its entrenched camp by all means in its power. It knows it has not the need to recommend to the admirable Parisian population a calm resolution and sang froid, for it shows every day it is equal to its greatest duties.

"The proclamation was issued by the Minister of the Interior, who said the decision had been taken solely upon the demand of the military authorities because the fortified places of Paris, while not necessarily likely to be attacked, would become the pivot of the field operations of the two armies.

SAYS HE WILL DEFEND PARIS TO THE END

Military Governor Issues Proclamation to Inhabitants of Capital. PARIS, Sept. 7.—It is officially announced that General Gallieni, commander of the army defending the city, issued the following proclamation to the inhabitants of Paris:

"The members of the government of the Republic have left Paris in order to give a new impetus to the defense of the nation. I have been ordered to defend Paris against the invader. This order I will fulfill to the end.

"GALLIENI, Military Governor of Paris, Commanding the Army of Paris."

SWEDEN IS URGED TO JOIN

Repeated Effort to Influence Nation Causes Anxiety. LONDON, Sept. 7.—Telegraphing from Stockholm, the correspondent of the Star says:

"There is great anxiety in the Swedish capital because of the efforts Germany is making, as shown by articles in the German newspapers, to induce Sweden to abandon her attitude of neutrality and take the field as an ally of Germany.

PARIS IS CLOSELY GUARDED

None May Enter or Leave Between 5 and 5 Without Permit. PARIS, Sept. 7.—No person may enter or leave Paris between 5 o'clock in the evening and 5 o'clock in the morning without a military permit.
