IN FROM SOUTH

Redondo and Nann Smith Arrive—Crews Differ About Time Made by Vessels

The Redondo and Nann Smith arrived in yesterday from San Francisco after a good trip up the coast. There was some rivalry between the two vessels and they differ as to the time. The Nann Smith officers claimed to have gained four hours on the Redondo en route up the coast, while the Redondo claimed to have gained about forty minutes on the Nann Smith. The Nann Smith had the bulk of the freight and passenger business, leaving there first.

It is expected that the Redondo will go on drydock this trip and have a new bronze wheel put on and this will materially add to her speed. The Nann Smith will not go on drydock until some time this winter. Both vessels will leave tomorrow. Owing to yesterday being Labor Day, neither vessel discharged her freight. Both will sail Thursday for the south, the Redondo going to San Pedro.
