POOR SALE FOR BONDS.

Denver Firm Withdraws Offer for Coquille Securities.

Recorder Lawrence read a letter from the Wright Bonding Company, Denver, i which they withdrew of Denver, in which they withdrew fund warrant bonds. A special meet-ing had been held Tuesday to consider their offer, which was received that day. They offered to take the city's "6 per cent" bonds at a premium of \$13.50, the city to pay 5 per cent, or \$1500, for having the records of proceedings examined and for printing the bonds. Inasmuch as the Council had advertised 5 per cent bonds, they objected to paying \$1500 bonus for the privilege of selling them at 6 per cent, and so notified the bonding company.
