New Home.—Good progress is being made on the new house of Mrs. George Wulff in Ferndale. It will be modern in every way. Her son-in-law, Robert Peters, who recently moved here with his family from San Francisco, is building it.

Another Popular Excursion.—The steamer Alert will leave at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning for Allegany on what will probably be the last excursion of this kind this year. Autos will meet the boat at Allegany to go to the Silver and Golden Falls.

At Siege of Paris.—E. A. Eickworth, a well known Coos Bay pioneer, is one of the few veterans of the Franco-Prussian War in this vicinity. He served in the German army that invested Paris after the long siege and remembers it vividly.

Mr. and Mrs. Stanley came to Marshfield on the early morning boat, leaving their children at home. Shortly after their arrival in Marshfield they received the news of the conflagration by telephone.

Feared for Husband.—Mrs. Powell, wife of the proprietor of the Blanco Cafe, appealed to Justice Penneck to try and locate her husband, who left a couple of weeks ago for Curry county. She has not heard from him since and fears he may have met with an accident or foul play. Powell is a negro and is said to be well-to-do.

Change Districts.—According to a report from Coquille, plans are under consideration for changing the road districts between here and Coquille. The plan is said to be to divide District No. 9, know as the Taylor Siglin district, and add it to District No. 5 under P. P. Norton, and District No. 15 under J. Yoakam.

Fix Curbing.—Peart Brothers, who put in the concrete curb on South Broadway, have arranged so that they will make the balance of the fill, sufficient to protect the curb against heavy rains. Warren Brothers, who have the contract, will have to reimburse them for the work. Just when Warren Brothers will be able to go ahead with the paving is still uncertain.

Mr. Hall-Lewis also arranged for the completion of the grading to Empire, which will be done under the supervision of the Supervisor, W. H. Perkins. The county has appropriated \$2000 from the general fund for this purpose.

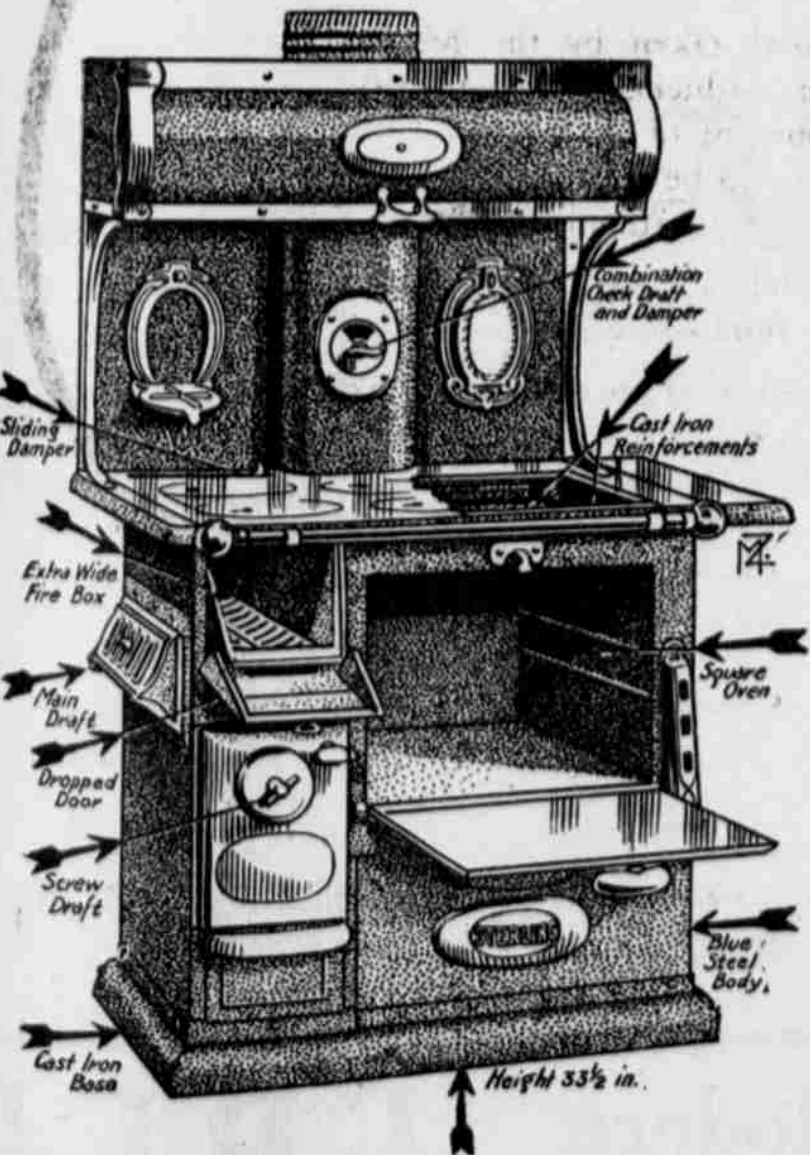
