DRINKS CAUSE OF MUCH GRIEF

Arthur Yake Makes Written Statement to Police About Affair Saturday Night

Serious charges were preferred against a number of Marshfield young men in a statement recorded at the police station early yesterday morning by Arthur Yake, who was taken into custody by Officers Doane and Shope when they broke up a bottle party on the waterfront.

Yake in his statement to the police registrar says that he will not be eighteen years old until next January. He says that late Saturday night he and eight others, three of whom are considerably under age, drank about twenty bottles of beer and a bottle of wine. He names in his written statement to the police the following as members of the crowd: Arthur and Otha Yake, Amil Matson, Ruda Matson, L. McLain, Joe Schott, Happy Holbrook, Roy Ruffner and a Bandon auto driver whose name is said to be Hall.

The police allege that some of the boys were badly under the influence of liquor. Yake says in his statement that some of the beer was furnished by Schott and was drunk along Front street and the wharf.

Mr. Schott yesterday was feeling grieved over the matter as he said that he did not know the boys were under age. He said that he knew them all and after the prize fight at North Bend he brought some bottled beer along to drink. When they quit playing pool, he invited some of his companions to have a drink with him and others came along and also drank. He says that it is the first time that he was ever arrested and he regrets it very much. Had not those in the party been around pool halls and bars where they are supposed to be 21 he thinks the trouble might have been avoided.

In addition to what action the local officers may take today, Mr. Schott was informed that the Yake boy's statement had been sent to District Attorney Liljeqvist.
