**TO GET JENNINGS**

**District Attorney Liljeqvist Appealed To Geo. M. Brown**

The Roseburg Review in a story concerning the Empire saloon robbery, says:

"Mr. Liljeqvist informed Sheriff George Quine and District Attorney Brown that he had issued subpoenas for the men who are alleged to have been held up but had been unable to locate Thomas or Frank Jennings. Inquiry, he said, revealed the fact that they boarded a stage early yesterday morning en route to Roseburg. That they were attempting to get out of the country was the theory advanced by the Coos County official. Immediately upon receipt of the information, District Attorney Brown issued duplicate grand jury subpoenas and the same were placed in the hands of Sheriff Quine for service. Sheriff Quine met all incoming stages arriving here last night, but neither of the Jennings boys were aboard. The stage drivers alleged that neither of the men had sought passage from Marshfield, and consequently they have not been located."
