

DROPS DEAD IN LOCAL STORE

Wm. R. Davis, Prominent Marshfield Man, Succumbs Suddenly Saturday Night

W. R. Davis, one of the best-known citizens of Marshfield, dropped dead of apoplexy late Saturday evening in Tower's Jewelry Store on Front street. The attack was most sudden. Mr. Davis having just returned Saturday from a northern visit with Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ashman, his brother-in-law. At the time he and his niece, Miss Lena Ashman, were in the store picking out a present which he wished to present to his daughter, Miss Ethel Davis. He survived only a few minutes after the collapse. Mr. Davis was born in McMinnville, Oregon, September 25, 1859, and came to Coos Bay in 1866, and made his home here continuously since that time. He was for years employed by the Coos Bay Water Company and also engaged in the carpentering and contracting business. His wife preceded him in death a few years and he is survived by three children, Mrs. J. C. Swanson, of West Marshfield, Miss Ethel Davis and J. W. Davis. Mr. Davis was comfortably well to do and owing to heart trouble had not been active the last few years. He was a member of the Moose and also of the Foresters. The funeral will be held at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. C. Swanson, 123 South Third street, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the Rev. J. E. Knotts officiating. His sudden death was a severe shock to the many friends of the family.

SHOT TO STOP LAKESIDE MAN

E. Daly Arrested for Robbing Hauser Camps and as Suspect—Laborer Robbed

E. Daly, charged with the theft of provisions and supplies from the Hauser & Hauser camps in the Ten Mile district and suspected of being involved in the robbery of Olaf Severson's bar at Lakeside Friday night, was brought to North Bend and will have his preliminary hearing before Justice Shuster this afternoon. Daly denies his guilt. Before bringing Daly to North Bend, Lakeside had an exciting scene. Daly broke away and started to run. Constable Johnson opened fire to scare him and emptied his gun. Another man named Sprague also opened fire and declares that he hit him in the leg, but there is no indication of a shot or bullet hole in Daly's trousers and his leg is not injured. Daly had been on a three or four days' spree and quickly tired out in his sprint and Constable Johnson caught him. Daly was in Marshfield July 30 and 31 and wanted work and was told to go out to the railroad camps. **Report Man Wounded.** Constable Johnson reported that word was received in Lakeside of a shooting and holdup in the jungles near there Friday night. A railroad laborer was reported to have been wounded in the head and robbed of \$10. SHIPPING NEWS

METAL TAGS TO SHOW ORIGIN

New Advertisement Stunt for Shipping in Seals Bearing "Marshfield" Brand

Tom James, agent of the Arrow Line, has just received 1000 metal sealing tags, branded "U. S. Marshfield," with which to seal shipments. The tags are the first that ever bore the word "Marshfield" and will be a further advertisement on Coos Bay shipments. The Alvarado arrived in early yesterday from San Francisco and discharged a good shipment of miscellaneous freight. She is one of the Arrow Line vessels and was sent in here to maintain the schedule. The Paraiso will not stop on her northerly trip, but will put in while en route south from Portland. Under this arrangement, the company will be able to keep up their schedule for freight shipments between Coos Bay and San Francisco and Portland. The Yellowstone sailed yesterday for San Francisco after discharging Portland freight. North of Coos Bay, the weather was pretty good, except for a southwest breeze and swell. The Alvarado reported very rough weather south of Blanco with a strong northwest wind. The way in which weather conditions change at Cape Blanco and the fact that the wind blows from different directions on both sides of the Cape, generally, is a wonder of the coast mariners.

STR. HARDY HAS ACCIDENT

Vessel En Route South From Coos Bay Has to Take Tow Off Crescent City

The Steamer Hardy enroute from North Bend to San Francisco with a cargo of lumber from the Simpson Lumber Company, box shooks from the North Bend box factory and empty oil drums, got into trouble off Crescent City late Saturday and had to be taken in tow for San Francisco. The nature of the accident is not known here except that her engine was disabled. Whether she encountered rough weather or whether it was merely an accident in the engine room could not be learned. Jas H. Hardy wired his brother who is now at North Bend, and Capt. Edgar Simpson. He asked for a new manifest of the cargo, indicating that they would have base the towage on the cargo. **Sailing Vessel Tied Up.** Capt. Edgar Simpson has been notified all off-shore lumber cargo charters have been cancelled owing to the war and in consequence their fleet of five sailing vessels will be tied up. The vessels which the Simpson Company retains are the Echo, Encore, Alumni, Omega and Churchill. The A. M. Simpson is now loading at Porter for San Francisco. The lumber market is poor, Capt. Simpson says, and he does not anticipate much improvement in it for some time.

POOR CROWD SEES BOXERS

Holbrook and Denzer went to it from the start and were pretty evenly matched until Holbrook got in his haymaker in the latter part of the second. Mason and Kolen seemed to be afraid of hurting each other. Sax says that he may arrange another card for the middle of next month.
