Day Of Prayer For Peace

OCTOBER 4

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA:

"A PROCLAMATION.

"Whereas, great nations of the world have taken up arms against one another and war now draws millions of men into battle whom the counsel of statesmen have not been able to save from the terrible sacrifice;

"And whereas, as in all things it is our privilege and duty to seek counsel and succor of Almighty God, humbling ourselves before Him, confessing our weakness and our lack of any wisdom equal to these things;

"And whereas, it is the especial wish and longing of the people of the United States, in prayer and counsel and all friendliness, to serve the cause of peace;

"Therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do designate Sunday, the fourth day of October next, a day of prayer and supplication and do request all God-fearing persons to repair on that day to their places of worship and there unite their petitions to Almighty God, that overruling the council of men, setting straight the things they cannot govern or alter, taking pity on the nations now in the throes of conflict in His mercy and goodness showing a way where men can see none, He vouchsafe His children healing peace again and restore once more that concord among men and nations without which there can be neither happiness nor true friendship nor any wholesome fruit of toil or thought in the world; praying also to this end that He forgive us our sins, our ignorance of His holy will, our wilfulness and many errors and lead us in the paths of obedience to places of vision and thoughts and counsels that purge and make us wise.

"In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the city of Washington, the eighth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fourteen and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and sixty-ninth.

GERMANS WANT VICTIMS TO AID

LIN, Sept. 15.—The commander of the German troops are making a proclamation to the inhabitants of every hostile town they occupy as follows:

"A body of the German army under my command occupies your city. Inasmuch as the war is carried on between the armies, I advise in due form the life and private property of all the citizens under the following conditions:

"The inhabitants must avoid every hostile act toward the German troops. Food and forage for our horses are to be furnished by the inhabitants. Every delivery will be paid for in coin or a receipt issued to be redeemed at the termination of the war.

"The inhabitants are to be treated in the most humane manner and to keep their houses lighted at night. The inhabitants are to remove all obstacles from the roads in passable condition and to remove all obstacles by the enemy and to give the best support to our order that they may be able to fulfill their task, difficult in a hostile situation.

"The inhabitants are to be forbidden to collect on the streets, to sell or to communicate the enemy in any way. Weapons in possession of the inhabitants are to be turned over to the town authorities within two hours.

"The Mayor, and clergy, and well-reputed citizens are to appear before me as hostages during the occupation of the troops. Under no conditions—I repeat—may the private property of the inhabitants be plundered. The strict discipline of our soldiers and renders it possible that the inhabitant will be able to neglect his business or to desert his home. On the other hand, the most favorable conditions are not to be adopted as soon as the conditions are not favorable to the hostages.

"Every citizen who is armed with a weapon in his possession is to be held as a hostage. Any act of violence toward our troops, or toward the city is regarded as a deed of evil.

every individual citizen and the citizens will do well to keep mutual oversight over each other in order that they may avoid the unpleasant consequences that must follow upon any co-operation with the enemy.

As a consequence of non-observance of such proclamations a number of villages on the French frontier have been burned and the inhabitants severely punished.

WAR NECESSARY TO SAVE NATION'S HONOR
King George Declares Combat an Assault on Civilization—Issues Message.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—The official information bureau today gave out a message from King George to the British colonies. It is as follows:

"King George's Message.
"During the last few weeks the people of my whole empire at home and overseas have moved with one mind and purpose to confront and overthrow an unparalleled assault on the continuity of civilization and the peace of mankind.

"The calamitous conflict is not of my seeking. My voice has been cast throughout on the side of peace. My ministers earnestly strove to allay the causes of the strife and to appease difference with which my kingdom was a party, the soil of Belgium was violated and her cities made desolate, when the very life of the French nation was threatened with extinction, I should have sacrificed my honor and given to destruction the liberties of my empire and of mankind.
"I rejoice that every part of the empire is with me in this decision."

STATEMENT OF FRENCH

Claim Germans Were Retiring All Along the Line.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
PARIS, Sept. 15.—It was officially announced yesterday afternoon that the Germans were still retiring everywhere. They are abandoning all the positions which they erected to cover a possible retreat. The statement follows:

"First on our left wing the enemy had prepared, to the north of Aisne, between Compiègne and Soissons, a line of defense which it was forced to abandon. Some detachments which it had held at Amiens now have retired on Perrone and St. Quentin.

Second, on the center the Germans took up a defensive position behind Reims, but were unable to hold it. In the Argonne region they turned back toward the north beyond Belnos forts and Traincourt. On the right wing the retreating movement of the Germans is general from Nancy to the Vosges. Sunday evening French territory in this vicinity was completely evacuated stretching from Nantuil, where the British forces are, to Vitry."
