Won Two Games.—The Blue Ridge Tigers' ball team took a new lead Sunday when they defeated Camp One and the Hatchery team 11 to 1 and the South Inlet aggregation 9 to 4 at Daniels Creek Sunday.

Names House.—Rev. G. LeRoy Hall, who has just completed remodeling and enlarging one of his houses, the one located at Ninth and Donnelly, has named it the Duplex House, owing to it being made a double structure.

Good Fishing.—Al Smith was down from Coos River today and reports good fishing. Last night John Leishman's boat landed twenty-one Chinooks, weighing almost 500 pounds. The fishermen are getting three cents a pound now.

For Concerts.—Hugh McLain, president of the Chamber of Commerce, has written C. C. Chapman, of the Oregon Development League, to arrange for a series of free public concerts by the Coos Bay Concert Band in Portland just after the Oregon State Fair.

Locates Here.—C. K. Kinsey, an expert photographer who makes a specialty of view work, has located here and established his family in the Smith apartments on Hall avenue. He has been taking views of the McDonald and Vaughan camps for the West Coast Lumberman.

Go to Court.—Constable Cox and Justice Pennock went to Coquille on Monday as witnesses in the notorious Fox auto case. Harry G. Hoy now suing V. C. Gorst for it. Mayor Allen, John Goss and others were once cited for contempt of court in connection with it.

Sugar Higher.—Sugar jumped 25 cents per sack yesterday, making it \$7.80 wholesale in Marshfield. Wholesalers claim that England alone has bought 600,000 tons of sugar in the last few weeks, forcing the market higher. Flour is on the verge of a raise and it is claimed that sugar will go still higher.

Ready for Service.—E. Lindberg, proprietor of the Bunker Hill store, was in Marshfield yesterday. He is a second lieutenant in the Swedish Army Reserves and has been notified to hold himself in readiness for a call to arms. There are a number of Swedish people in this vicinity who are eligible and may be called upon in case Sweden becomes involved, and the local Swedish people think that Russia will force them in. They will be aligned against Russia.

Had Fine Trip.—J. G. Kinney and family and J. W. Hildenbrand and family have returned from a delightful auto tour. They went down the coast via Bandon, Gold Beach and Crescent City, thence

to Grants Pass and Roseburg and home via the old Coos Bay wagon road. They did not suffer any inconveniences from the rain which was comparatively light in the interior. They sustained a broken axle which delayed them a few hours, but this was the only mishap they encountered. Coming in, they started the residents along the old Coos Bay wagon road who did not believe their eyes when they saw the machine coming through the heavy rains. Mr. Hildenbrand says that the Coos County roads were the worst that they encountered on the trip.
