Slightly Hurt.—Tom McCallum, of Foradale, a longshoreman, had his foot and leg slightly bruised while working in the hold of the Nann Smith this afternoon, some brick slipping out of the sling and striking him. The injuries, although not serious, are quite painful.

Inspect Flyer.—Messrs. Edwards and Fuller, the U. S. boat inspectors, will tomorrow inspect the steamer Flyer, which has been converted into a tug as a Southern Pacific tender for the bridge work. They have been making their annual tour of inspection of this section and will probably leave tomorrow for Portland.

No Call Yet.—Mr. Lindberg of the Bunker Hill Store states that he was misunderstood relative to a call to hold himself in readiness for service in the Swedish army, he being a second lieutenant of the Reserves. He says that he has not received such a call, although from unofficial news from that section he expected that he might be called.

Fruit Cheap.—Mrs. C. M. Conner has returned from Salem, where she has spent a few weeks with her father and mother, Rev. and Mrs. Beatty, both of whom have been ill. Mrs. Conner says that there is a big crop of fruit in the valley and great quantities of it are going to waste owing to the price not being high enough to warrant gathering it.

Dies in California.—Word has been received here of the death of Mrs. Walker, former Miss Rose McCullough, of Haynes Inlet, at her home in California. She has been absent from here for a few years. Her brother died a few days ago. She is survived by several brothers and sisters in this section. The funeral will be held in California.

Squirrels Bother.—Frank Denning says that he has positive proof that Cell Ireland is growing old. He says that he had a long distance message from Cell, who is spending the month at the home ranch at Ollala in which he said that the digger squirrels out there can run twice as fast as they used to. Denning says that the squirrels are just the same, but that Ireland has forgotten that forty years have elapsed since as a spry sixteen-year old lad, Cell used to run them down. Denning refuses to tell how old Cell is but says there is only a year's difference between them.

GARDINER AUTO BURNS.

Last Sunday afternoon the automobile owned by Grant Erhart was burned near M. B. Bedofe's camp, on the road between Gardiner and Ada. At the time it caught fire Mr. Erhart and family and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Austin, were out on a trip to the lake country. At the time of the accident the party had arrived at Mr. Bedofe's engineering camp and had stopped to water up, and in starting up the carburetor shot back, igniting the oil which had accumulated in the ans. Every effort was made by all of the party, assisted by several men of the camp, to extinguish the flames, but to no avail. The fire totally destroyed the body of the car and part of the running gear. In trying to put out the fire Mr. Erhart severely burned his hands and arms, his right hand and arm more than the other. Mr. Bedofe dressed the burns at his camp before Mr. Erhart returned home. Mr. and Mrs. Jewett, who happened to pass by, brought the children to town and a team was sent out for the rest of the party.—Umpqua Courier.
