### LIBRARY WORK.

The North Bend Public Library Association had its first business meeting of the year at the library Thursday afternoon. The library has now been open four months and with less than 500 loan books on its shelves it has loaned on an average of over 400 books a month. This is not taking into account the couple of hundred magazines, new and old, loaned and exchanged every month. This is certainly a record North Bend may well be proud of, as it is probably equalled by but few city libraries.

Steps were taken at Thursday's business meeting to keep the library open every afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock, beginning October first. At the same time evening classes in the common English branches will be started for Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings. A charge of fifty cents a week will be made for this class work. Persons holding an Association membership card will be credited with the price of this card, two dollars, on class work. Each student must provide his own textbooks and other supplies. The instruction in this evening work will be individual to a large extent. The advisability of opening a reading room for men on Sherman avenue was talked of and a committee appointed to look into the matter and report at the October meeting of the association.

Playground work as a part of the library extension movement was also discussed. The library association will hold a children's party at Loggie Hall Friday afternoon, September 25th, from 3 to 5 o'clock. Mrs. C. M. Byler, Mrs. Herbert Armstrong, Mrs. Shimian, Miss Frances Golden and Mrs. L. A. Woodbury will chaperone the party. A charge of five and ten cents will be made, which will be used to buy children's books for the public library.

The following books have been added to the library during the past week: "The Barrier," "Inside of the Cup," "Laddle," "Rupert of Hentzau," "Self Raised," "Alice for Short," "John Barleycorn," "The Celebrity," "The Fifth String by Sousa" and "The Winning of Barbara Worth."

## F. A. WICKMAN IN WAR ZONE

### Former Marshfield Man Returns From Holland—Tells of Experiences

The following letter to The Times from F. A. Wickman from Chicago, under date of September 13, will be of interest on Coos Bay, as Mr. Wickman was reared in Marshfield and is now en route to his home in Berkeley after spending two years in Europe: "I arrived in Chicago last evening from Boston on my way to California. Reached New York last Monday on the S. S. Rotterdam from Rotterdam. Have had many interesting experiences since the war broke out, and when I have more time will write you concerning them. Before leaving Berlin I was arrested as a spy and spent three hours at the police station before proving I was an American citizen. Expect to spend a few days in the Grand Canyon of Arizona and will take a short motor trip with friends in southern California, before returning to Berkeley, where I will resume my teaching about October 1."
