The following letter to The Times from F. A. Wickman from Chicago, under date of September 13, will be of interest on Coos Bay, as Mr. Wickman was reared in Marshfield and is now en route to his home in Berkeley after spending two years in Eurtion:

"I arrived in Chicago last evening from Boston on my way to Califor-nia. Reached New York last Monday on the S. S. Rotterdam from Rotterdam. Have had many interesting experiences since the war broke out, and when I have more time will write you concerning them. Before leaving Berlin I was arrested as a spy and spent three hours at the police station before proving I was an American citizen. Expect to spend few days in the Grand Canyon of Arizona and will take a short motor trip with friends in southern California before returning to Berkeley, where I will resume my teaching about October 1."
