It is known that they have completed an investigation of the auto accident near Coquille in which a young man was killed when Joe Schilling, Jr., had his car upset. No report has been made yet.  
An investigation of the Myrtle Point bank case is underway in connection with the probe of the charges against Peaslee or Harris, now in jail. Ed Rackleff, former cashier of the bank, is here from Florence and other officials have been summoned. One or two witnesses, including a Mrs. Morris, have been ill and unable to appear.

## UNKNOWN JAP WARSHIP BUSY

### Think She Must Have Been One to Collide With Leggett—Still Near Scene

The mysterious Japanese warship which yesterday reported the sinking of the Frances H. Leggett is still off the Oregon coast today and is simply jockeying around. Apparently she is remaining near the scene of the disaster.

The Jap vessel refuses to give her name or tell anything about herself. Yesterday she was working almost constantly with the Canadian wireless stations. Today she has been working with the Canadian stations and sending messages to the Japanese Consul at Vancouver. It is practically certain from wireless messages received here that if the Leggett was sunk by a collision that it was with the unknown Japanese warship. The Idzuma, which Astoria messages report as supposed to be the one that

collided with the Leggett, was not at the scene until this morning. Early today the Idzuma was headed south toward the scene of the disaster and was then two miles off the Columbia.

Why the Jap warship would not give details of how or why the Leggett sank, or of her own identity or mission, seems strange under the circumstances.

The Jap warship did not report saving anyone, although a rumor had it that she saved eleven. This morning the vessels at the scene of the disaster stated positively that only two passengers were saved.
