Takes Place.—Geo. N. Bolt is taking charge of Mayor F. E. Allen's private work here while the latter is spending a week at Portland.

Society to Meet.—There will be a meeting of the Anglican Young People's Association tomorrow evening at 7:30 at Guild Hall. All members are urged to be in attendance.

Wants Office.—According to reports from the Ten Mile country, Chas. St. Denis is seeking the postmastership there and has hopes of landing it.

Child Dies.—Albert Lindrose, a two-year-old child, died at Ten Mile Sunday. The funeral will be held there tomorrow, the Rev. R. E. Browning of Marshfield officiating.

Plank Curtis Avenue.—Johnson & Larson will start planking Curtis avenue tomorrow, having made a private contract with the abutting property owners between Second and Broadway.

Goes to School.—Mrs. L. A. Schapers, of Allegany, accompanied by her daughter, Agnes, came down on the boat this morning and this afternoon the daughter will leave for Gravel Ford, where she is expecting to attend school this winter.

Start Street Work.—Perham & Gidley Saturday noon completed the grading on North Eighth street and started moving their steam shovel outfit to Tenth street in Perham Park and expect to get the latter work under way by tomorrow.

Father Dying.—Fred Tipton, a Marshfield barber, has been summoned to his old home in Edenbowser, Oregon, by the sad news of the serious illness of his father, who has been stricken with paralysis and is not expected to live.

Move to Coquille.—William Berry, a rancher who owns a homestead in the vicinity of Allegany, accompanied by his wife and their household effects, came down on the boat this morning. The couple are expecting to move to Coquille, where they will reside.

Start Work.—Shipman & Bunting are arranging to start work on improving a road leading to Bunsten Park where they will prosecute improvements as rapidly as the weather will permit. They have received their permit from the Secretary of State to conduct business under the corporation name.

On Vacation.—Capt. B. W. Olson, of the Nann Smith, is taking his annual vacation which he will spend at home here and plans to enjoy himself for three weeks. First Mate Gust Lundquist, who has been with Capt. Olson for years and one of the ablest of mariners, is now in command of the Adeline, leaving with her yesterday.

Will Become Lawyer.—Duncan Douglas, son of W. H. Douglas, expects to leave in the morning for Portland where he will enter the University of Oregon Law School. The young man is a graduate of the Marshfield High School, having finished his work there last spring. The law course given in Portland covers a period of three years.

Good Potato Crop.—In the vicinity of Haynes Inlet the farmers today began the digging of their main crop of potatoes which they report to be on an average with the yields of former years, but better, in that there is absolutely no blight to spoil the product. The general run of prices ranges around one and one-half cents a pound and the farmers there are of the belief that they will do well this year.

Got One Deer.—John Ferguson, Ralph Kruse, Wm. Bahr, Geo. McCullough and Jack Morgan, the latter two from Haynes Inlet, have returned from a week's outing and deer hunt at the Gould ranch above Allegany. They had fine fishing, landing about 100 one morning. They also got a shot at a bear, but failed to land Bruin. They report that the heavy rains made hunting difficult, although there are lots of deer in that section.

Road is Progressing.—That at least one-third of the grading on the new county road between North Bend and Empire is completed, is the statement of W. U. Douglas, who yesterday walked over the distance of two miles, the length of the thoroughfare. Workmen are busy grading and blasting and when they have finished it is expected that they will have reduced the former high grades to a reasonable percent. It is not expected that the roadway will be completed this fall.

Goes to Conference.—Mayor F. E. Allen left yesterday for Portland as the lay delegate from the Marshfield Methodist church to attend the annual M. E. Conference of Oregon. Rev. J. E. Knotts also left. The Marshfield congregation sent resolutions asking that Rev. Knotts be re-assigned here for another year, as he is desirous of returning here, and it is expected that the Bishop will grant the joint wish. During his pastorate here, the church has been very successful. Last year they raised about \$1160 in addition to the usual expenses of the church.

At Roseburg there were no races but there was a good agricultural exhibit.
