DEEP WATER CHANNEL TO COOSTON COMPLETED

INSIST MILL SLOUGH DRAIN BE REPAIRED

Judge J. S. Coke has issued an order that the City of Marshfield and Port of Coos Bay appear in court at Coquille next Monday afternoon and show cause, if any, why he should not issue a mandatory writ of injunction sought by W. T. Stoll in behalf of John Hillstrom et al requiring either or both of the defendants to keep the Mill Slough drain open.

This order follows a previous hearing in which Judge Coke temporarily delayed the issuance of the injunction to give either the port of Coos Bay or the city time in which to repair or improve the drain.

Now Hillstrom and other residents west of Tenth Street claim that the drain has resulted in their property being overflowed again and they insist that something be done at once.

Mr. Stoll points out that the water accumulating west of Tenth street menace to the health of the public. He says that while there is no proof that the unsanitary conditions resulting from the overflow are responsible for the present cases of scarlet fever and diphtheria, he knows that the flood water will probably aid in spreading the diseases and making a contagion. He is also fearful of it causing an epidemic of typhoid.

He declares that something must be done to protect the public health as well as the property.
