Described as a dignified substitute for the tango, La Furiana has been taken up eagerly abroad, or was beginning to be adopted when war hushed the orchestras and emptied the ball rooms.

Of all the old dances the waitz alone seems destined to be perennially popular, and Miss Alice Buckenmeyer, who has yielded to the trend of the times and is teaching the modern dances while discouraging their more exaggerated developments, believes that the smooth old waltz with its wave like movement will reign supreme over the extravagant intruders at no distant time.


