**T**WINKLE Hesitation, if you like, La Furlana if you will, but in the name of all the twinkling toes of Terpsichore, don't do the Bunny Hug or the Lame Duck says an exchange.

Or, if the twinkle stuff is not strenuous enough for your temperament, and La Furlana reminds you of a nickel cigar, you will still be heeding the latest dictates of dance-dom if you try a Half-and-Half, or a Lulu Fardo, by some called the "Luna Fado," the last named being especially calculated to harmonize with moonlight effects. The "Lulu Fardo" was christened "Lulu Fardo," but dancing masters have agreed it shall be "Lulu Fado" in future.

Don't admit that you even remember such archaic steps as the Turkey Trot or the Boston Waltz. Rather ask any one who mentions the new dances if they know any of the new variations of the tango, the maxixe or the Pavlova gavotte, for these movements seem to have become staple, and whatever their derivations may be called as the season develops, the tangoist and the maxixists still will "have the edge" on those who still cling to the "rag variations."

There will be a place yet on smart dancing programs for the old-fashioned waltz, that roused Byron to fiery condemning verse 100 years ago. It has become by natural evolutionary processes the tamest commonplace of the waxed floor.

A reflection of the thing that grips the thought of all the world will be seen in a revival of the military schottische and others of the stately dances that go with gold braid and epaulets may be seen before the 1914-15 season has waxed and waned.

Thus decree the dancing authorities, who have made note of and agreed on the latest Terpsichorean edicts. The year 1914-15 is to be a quite decorous year so far as dancing is concerned.

Two walking steps forward—balance back—quick change with one foot back and the other forward during the fourth measure—repeat—now—hes-i-tate, and lo, you have the Twinkle Hesitation which glides into the season with the advance notice that it is to lead all others in popularity.

This is the formula and the verdict of M. Christensen, and among the newer steps which he mentions as due for high favor are the Half-and-Half, described as an airy, fairy movement in five-four time, and the one-step in all its variations, distinguished for their easy-flowing grace.

Other dances that share in the prediction of popularity are the tango, in form both old and new, and the "Luna Fado" (the Luna Fardo), a spirited figure which probably will find especial favor with the lithe-limbed, strong-lunged younger generation—although grandpa found last season that the tango was better than liniment for rheumatism, and took chances on arteriosclerosis with as gay and thumping a heart as sweet sixteen.

Described as a dignified substitute for the tango, La Furlana has been taken up eagerly abroad, or was beginning to be adopted when war hushed the orchestras and emptied the ball rooms.

Another that is rapidly tipping into favor is the Pavlova Gavotte, a quaint and dainty step that is reminiscent of the minuet.

Of all the old dances the waltz alone seems destined to be perennially popular, and Miss Alice Buckenmeyer, who has yielded to the trend of the times and is teaching the modern dances while discouraging their more exaggerated developments, believes that the smooth old waltz with its wave like movement, will reign supreme over the extravagant intruders at no distant time.
