WHITE SLAVERY CASE, BELIEF

Man and Woman Well Armed, and Both Drunk Taken off This Morning.

A man and a woman, both badly intoxicated, and posing as father and daughter, were taken off the George W. Elder when she docked here this morning from Portland, and placed in the city jail. Evidence found in their suitcases, especially consisting of two revolvers, some shells and a quantity of cocaine, led the officers to firmly believe that a white slavery case has been exposed through the weakness of the actors in the case to leave liquor alone until after their arrival here.

Papers on the man, who is about 45 years of age, give his name as J. W. Shannon. Some of these papers bore evidence that he had at one time been a well known and respected citizen, not only of Idaho, but of California as well. The name of the woman, who is about 35 years of age, could not be learned, though officers aboard the boat declare the couple passed as father and daughter. That claim is strongly doubted by the Marshfield officers, who declare their belief that the woman was being brought here for immoral purposes.

The two were locked in jail, both so drunk as to be almost insensible. Their baggage was searched at the police station. In the woman's valise was found a small .32 caliber revolver, together with a box of bullets, a quantity of cocaine and a pint bottle of whiskey. Shannon's suit case disclosed another ugly looking revolver and with it a box of shells. He also carried about \$17 in coin besides an expensive Howard watch.

The woman is not very large and the fact that her hair has been cut short and that her suitcase also contained several men's shirts, has also led to the belief that she either has or was going to dress like a man. When taken from the boat she was insensible and a doctor was summoned to investigate whether or not she was "doped." Dr. Horsfall declared her case one of "too much booze."

Officers of the Elder stated that the couple came aboard in Portland pretty much under the influence of liquor, that they were more or less drunk during the voyage here and that at North Bend the couple secured another cargo of whiskey which served to land them both here with "four sheets in the wind."

Papers found on Shannon show that he was elected county surveyor of Idaho county, Idaho, in 1896 and in that same year he was appointed by Governor J. McConnell as delegate to the Immigration Convention at Boise. The papers were badly worn, as though they had been long carried and often used in succeeding life of hard living as evidence of good character. Several recommendations of a later date show that Shannon, descended from his position as a county surveyor, was the foreman of a railroad gang on the Fernley-Lassen and Susanville branch of the Central Pacific from November 10, 1913, to May 31, 1914.

The couple are still in such a condition in jail that they can not be questioned and the officers declare that they shall be held until a full investigation can be made and their records received.
