DUCK SEASON IN A FEW DAYS

Glasgow Gun Club Makes Preparation—all Hunters Clean Out Their Shotguns.

With the opening of the duck season only a few days away, there is a peculiar glint to be noticed in the eyes of the old time hunters. Many may be seen dreaming on the back porch these days as they lovingly pat the veteran shotgun and polish the barrel inside until it shines like the morning sun.

In the morning members of the Glasgow Gun Club expect to leave for their hunting preserve on Haynes Inlet. They will take with them a scow load of materials and provisions and spend the day getting ready for the big season which opens early next Thursday morning. The blinds will be renovated and the decoys arranged for instant operation, and the cabin will be cleaned throughout.

Sportsmen should remember that some important changes have been made in the game seasons by the federal laws which are now in effect, and which take precedence over the state laws. Clip this out and familiarize yourself with it. It is official.

It is now lawful to shoot ducks and geese in any part of Oregon from October 1 until January 15. The bag limit is thirty in any seven consecutive days.

Furthermore it is lawful to shoot black-breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jack-snipe, and greater and lesser-legs from October 1 until December 15. The limit is thirty in any seven consecutive days.

It is lawful to shoot doves in any part of Oregon from September 1 until October 31. The bag limit is ten doves within a week.

Though the male Chinese preasants may be killed in most parts of western Oregon, it is unlawful to shoot them in Coos, Curry, Tillamook, Josephine, Jackson or Clatsop counties. The deer season will last until October 31.
