FRENCH CLAIM ALLIES ARE TURNING GERMAN RIGHT WING

Report That Germans Had Been Routed Proves Untrue—French Claim German Attacks Repulsed and That Kaiser's Army Suffered Heavy Loss.

NOTABLE MOVEMENTS OCCURS IN CENTER OF LONG BATTLE LINE TODAY

Germans Confirm Reported Assault on Antwerp and Claim That they Repulsed Sorties By Belgian Garrisons—Claim Russians Repulsed in Poland.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—The turning movement against the German's right wing is developing rapidly, according to the French war office. Rumors, however, that the Germans have been routed proved untrue. The French also claim a vigorous German assault on Tracy-Le-Mont was repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy.

While the allies have made slight advances between Arras and Meuse, no notable movement occurred on the center. The official German announcement states there has been general fighting on the German right but nothing of a decisive character transpired.

The French advances in the vicinity of Verdun and Toul has been renewed.

Berlin confirmed the assault on Antwerp and said attacks by the Belgium garrison had been repulsed.

Russian assaults in the vicinity of Suwaki, Russian Poland, have failed, says the German report.

The text of the statement is as follows: "On our left wing, north of the Somme river, the action continues to develop toward the north. To the north between the Aisne and Aisne, the enemy delivered a vigorous attack on Tracy-Le-Mont but were repulsed with heavy losses. In the center there is relative calm along the entire front which extends from Rheims to Meuse. Between the Arras and Meuse rivers we have made slight progress. In the Woyre district there have been severe battles. Our troops have advanced at several points, notably east of St. Michael. On our right in Lorraine and the Vosges there has been no change."

VIENNA PREPARES TO COMBAT EPIDEMIC OF ASIATIC CHOLERA

PARIS, Sept. 30.—A municipal council of Vienna has voted \$2,000,000 for the construction of isolation hospitals near the city in expectation of an epidemic of Asiatic cholera, according to the Milan correspondent of the Paris Mail. The correspondent says cholera is reported in various detachments of the army.

AMERICAN RED CROSS SHIP SAILS

FALMOUTH, Sept. 30.—An American hospital ship of the Red Cross sailed today for Paullac France. Rear Admiral Aaron Ward, retired in command of the vessel which carries Red Cross units that will serve with French armies.

HILL LINE TO TRY TO ROB HARTLINE BANK

Rumor That C. R. Smith is Negotiating With Them for Sale of Peninsula Property. Efforts to Dynamite Safe in Washington Town Fails—Bandits Escape.

HARTLINE, Wash., Sept. 30.—Three men made an unsuccessful attempt to rob the safe of the Hartline State Bank early today. After robbing a blacksmith shop of tools and a hardware store of dynamite, they attempted to blow the bank safe, but the explosion threw the safe over on its front so they could not open it. While the two worked on the safe, another robber stood in front and shot at citizens. The robbers escaped.

BELGIANS CLAIM TO HAVE REPULSED GERMANS BY SORTIES

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 30.—The following was received from Antwerp: "From various points the garrisons made sorties and repulsed the Germans with heavy losses. The bombardment of forts Woelhem and St. Catherine by the Germans continues. A single attack has been delivered by the Germans on fort Liezele and Breendonk."

LONDON, Sept. 30.—Dispatches from Amsterdam says refugees arrived from Ghent and report Belgium forces marching on Brussels are in contact with the Germans.

ITALY AND AUSTRIA CLASH AS RESULT OF MINE SINKING BOATS

LONDON, Sept. 30.—The report that all the 1885, 1886 and 1888 classes of Italian reserves would be called to colors early in October has been confirmed by several Italian newspapers, according to The Times correspondent at Venice. Eleven of the first category classes will then be under the flag and will total 1,390,000 men.

FLOATING MINE KILLS FISHING CREW

ITALY CALLS OUT RESERVES FOR SERVICE EARLY IN OCTOBER

LONDON, Sept. 30.—A Rome correspondent of the Evening News says as the result of the sinking of the Italian fishing boat near Ancona by Austrian floating mine, the Italian government has instructed its ambassador at Vienna to enter an energetic protest against mines, which prevent safe navigation of Adriatic.

ITALIAN GUNBOAT SUNK

ROME, Sept. 30.—An Italian torpedo boat is reported to have been sunk today by a mine between Venice and Comacchio, in Adriatic sea. No confirmation of report can be obtained in official circles.

TURKEY AND HOLLAND FEAR FLEETS OF GREAT BRITAIN

BERLIN, Sept. 30.—(By Wireless) Reports made public here from Constantinople declare that owing to the bellicose attitude of the British warships cruising near the Dardanelles, Turkey has closed this waterway. The people of Holland are excited by the reported capture of Dutch ships by the British. The Rotterdamche Courant declares that Great Britain is showing utter disregard to the rights of the neutral states.

ALLIES CLAIM PROGRESS IN MOVEMENT

Town of Alost Bombarded and Set on Fire by Kaiser's Heavy Guns This Afternoon With Heavy Fighting Along The Whole Front.

BELGIANS CLAIM TO HAVE DRIVEN GERMAN ADVANCES BACK LAST NIGHT

Late Dispatch From Antwerp Indicates That Terrific Onslaught Is Being Made by German Army Today—Meager Reports From Battle Zone.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—A dispatch from Antwerp says: "The Germans again bombarded Alost and set the town afire. Fierce fighting is raging at various points along the whole line."

GERMANS TELL OF DEVELOPMENTS

JAPS CAPTURE GERMAN GUNS

TOKIO, Sept. 30.—It is officially announced that a portion of the Japanese fleet landed a force which occupied Lao Chs harbor in the neighborhood of Tsing Tau. They took four field guns that were abandoned by the Germans and afterwards held the place with a small part of the force.

MONTENEGRO CLAIMS AUSTRIANS DEFEAT

LONDON, Sept. 30.—A dispatch from Cetinje says the Montenegrins on Monday occupied all the enemy's entrenchments around Corasda and pursued the Austrians who took flight.

RUSSIANS AND GERMANS IN FIERCE BATTLE SINCE SUNDAY

LONDON, Sept. 30.—A dispatch from Petrograd says a fierce engagement between the armies of General Rennenkamp and General Von Hindenberg has continued since Sunday along a line extending from Grodno to Druskenski on the Niemen river. The Russians have established civil government at Lemberg, capital of Austrian Galicia. In Belgium 150,000 troops are engaged in a desperate battle along the line from Termonde to Aerschot.

RUSSIANS CLAIM AUSTRIANS DEFEAT

ROME, Sept. 30.—The Russian ambassador here announces the Austrian Army, fleeing before the Russians have been surrounded near Douklo and its defeat was complete. All food, ammunition and war material, which was being conveyed back to Austria, has fallen into Russian hands. The capture includes 500 military automobiles.

WANT VILLA TO MAKE PEACE CONGRESS TO TAKE RECESS

Hundreds Wire Rebel Leader to End Strife in Mexico— Goes to Conference. President Wilson Approves Legislative Program for Next Few Months.

TORREON, Sept. 30.—General Villa has left here for Aguas Calientes, where he expects to meet General Obregon, head of the Mexican Commission from Carranza. Villa has received hundreds of messages from army officers urging him to make a peaceful settlement with Carranza.
