ELECTION NOTICE. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT it is proposed to annex to and include within the corporate boundary lines of the City of Eastside, in Coos County, Oregon, all that territory in said County and State, embraced within the following described boundaries, to-wit:

Beginning at a point which is the North-west corner of the boundary of the corporate limits of the City of Eastside, said point being the inter section of the mid-channel streams of Coos Bay and Coos River in Coos County, Oregon; running thence North-easterly to a point on the Harbor line as established by the Port of Coos Bay, which point is on the east side of the channel of Coos Bay and on the north side of the Coos River channel; thence Northerly along the Harbor line as established by said Port of Coos Bay to a point due west of the Meander post on the East shore of Coos Bay on the line between Sections 12 and 13, Township 25 South, Range 13 West W. M.; thence East to the quarter Section corner between said Sections 12 and 13; thence North one-fourth mile to the North-west corner of the Plat of Port-lawn Addition to the City of North Bend; thence East one-fourth mile; thence South 2948 feet, more or less, to the North-west corner of the Plat of Crawford Point Addition to the City of Coos Bay; thence East, one-fourth mile to the North-east corner of said Plat of Crawford Point Addition to the City of Coos Bay; thence South along the East boundary line of the said plat to the North-west corner of Section 19, Township 25 South, Range 12 West, W. M.; thence East one-half mile to the North quarter section corner of said Sec. 19, which point is the North-east corner of the Plat of Tozier Heights; thence South three-fourths mile, more or less to the North-west corner of the Plat of Bay View Addition to Millcooma; thence East one-fourth mile along the North boundary line of said Bay View Addition to Millcooma; thence West along the South boundary line of Section 19, to the Meander Post on the East shore of Coos Bay; thence South 60 degrees West to the mid-channel of Coos River; thence upstream along the mid-channel of Coos River to a point on the South boundary of Section 20, Township 25 South Range 12 West W. M.; thence West along the South boundary of said Section 20 to a point which is mid-stream in the channel of Catching Slough, said point being on the East boundary of the corporate limits of the City of Eastside; thence following the said East boundary of the corporate limits of the City of Eastside, Northerly, down mid-stream channel of Catching Slough to its mouth; thence North to the mid-channel of Coos River; thence along the North boundary of the said corporate limits of the City of Eastside in a Westerly direction, down-stream along the mid-channel of said Coos River to the Northwest corner of the boundary of said corporate limits of the City of Eastside, the place of beginning, all lying and being in the County of Coos, State of Oregon.

For the purpose of submitting the question of the annexation of the territory to the said City, to the qualified electors of said city and to the qualified electors residing within the boundary lines of said territory for their approval or rejection, a special election has been called by the City of Eastside and will be held within the corporate limits of the City of Eastside and within the boundaries of said territory, separately on the 23rd day of October, 1914 from the hour of 8 o'clock a. m., until the hour of 7 o'clock p. m., of said day, with one hour recess at noon. Such election will be held within the corporate limits of the City of Eastside on said day, at the city hall located therein. The Judges and Clerks appointed to serve at said election in said City are: Judges, E. A. Stonecypher and W. P. Byerly and Mrs. Minnie McLagan. Clerks: R. T. Whitty and L. S. Wilde and W. C. Weaver. The election within the boundaries of the territory proposed to be annexed will be held on said day at the Cooston Cash Store, therein. The Judges and Clerks appointed to serve at such election, in said territory are: Judges: W. L. Walker, Armstrong Bailey, and A. J. Arnot. Clerks are: W. E. Homme, M. L. Hunt, and L. G. Meeks. All qualified electors are hereby invited to attend on said date, at their respective polling places, above stated, and vote for or against said proposition of annexation.
