Lease Tract.

Mosara, Ford & Bonebrake have leased part of the E. M. Smith place on Isthmus Inlet and may put up a slaughter house there. They have been doing most of the slaughtering at the central slaughtering house in the Coquille Valley, but owing to the growth of the Union Meat Market's business here, they figure that it might be advantageous to handle some of it on this side.

Carter and Officer Richardson left for Coquille this morning, being called there to testify in connection with the robbing of the till in the Owl Saloon by George Francis of a week ago. The defense of Francis is that he was drunk at the time and was not in his right frame of mind when he broke out the side window and entered the saloon after the closing time. He was captured the following morning.

Mr. Pezanson is with the dredge Oregon and he and his bride will leave soon for Grays Harbor, where the Oregon is being transferred.

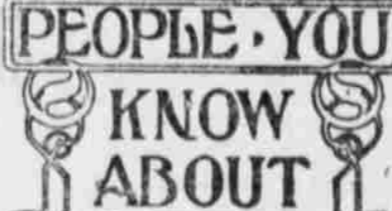
