**Asks for Retrial.**—Declaring that new evidence has been gathered in connection with the case of Ole Anderson versus William Borreo, the motion for a new trial was argued this morning before Judge Pennock by Attorney Tom Bennett, appearing for Borreo who yesterday was fined \$50 and costs for larceny, it being claimed that the manager of the Nutwood Saloon failed to return change out of a \$20 gold piece belonging to Anderson.

**Go North.**—Receiver Watters and Attorney Bryson left yesterday for Portland and Eugene, where they will confer further with Judge Harris relative to the sale of the Kinney properties. Whether it will be sold in bulk or parcelled out is a question. The debts and receivership expenses will probably exceed \$500,000. The sale of it in bulk is now unlikely, owing to the changes in financial conditions that the European war has wrought. W. J. Wilsey, who has had his eye on the property for several years, said when in here last that his plans for the English syndicate doing big things were all shot to pieces by the war.

Browning relates a novel experience on a trip through the railroad country. Having arrived at the railroad grade where the Scofield Creek in one of the widest points intercepts, there was no way to cross, and after waiting for several hours with no chance of a boat coming that way, a rude raft was constructed with the aid of fellow travelers. Though barely holding up one person, the raft saved the day and proceeding to Reedsport Rev. Browning sent a boat back for the rest of the stranded party.
