PETROMOULX IS FOUND GUILTY

To be Sentenced Monday for Petty Larceny—Mrs. O'Donnell Fined and Sentenced

(Special to The Times.)

COQUILLE, Or., Oct. 3.—Mrs. O'Donnell today received a sentence of three months in jail and to pay a fine of \$200 as the result of her conviction for selling liquor on Sunday at Empire. Her attorney, H. G. Hoy, argued an appeal of the case.

The jury in the case of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Petromoulx, of Alleghany, indicted for stealing and slaughtering a yearling calf belonging to Chas. Rodine at Alleghany found Petromoulx guilty of petty larceny, but discharged his wife. The jury also found that Rodine was entitled to \$35 damages, the value of the heifer. Petromoulx will be sentenced Monday at 3 o'clock. Judge Coke discharged the jury today. He will leave Thursday for Lakeview to hold court there.

Constable Cox, of Marshfield, was present as a witness for the state, though he was later subpoenaed by the defense, with part of the remains of the slaughtered calf which were dug from a pit in the rear of the Petromoulx home at Alleghany. At that time the meat was badly decayed and worm eaten. It was taken out of cold storage to bring here today and three times attempts were made to bring the bones and hide into the court room and each time the judge and jury arose in a body, gasping and sputtering as they held their noses and motioned the evidence back.

A piece of hide, used as an exhibit, was placed before the court stenographer, who came near making a hurried exit from the room, but Judge Coke beat him to it and ordered the evidence placed out in the street.
