

FIRST EXHIBIT IS GOING SOUTH GET RICH QUICK IS THIS CLEVER FORGER'S SCHEME

for Exposition go to Francisco Tuesday—Kept in Cold Storage

Large mysterious bottles of sea of preservatives and with some chuck full of "blue ribbon" shipped direct here from the Myrtle Point, J. A. Ward is these days getting ready for the county agricultural exhibit for the Nann Smith sails south Monday she will carry fourteen of well-packed, high grade apples the first of the exhibit to the Coos county. These apples will be placed in cold storage unopened of the Exposition in Coos county. Arrangements have been made so that all products which will be held there in the storerooms of San Francisco.

Special exhibits of fruits or extra well developed vegetables placed in big jars with a preservative of formaldehyde as a preservative. In his rooms on Front where he has made a working model of the past few days, Mr. Ward has corn, apples, peaches, and turnips in these jars. That storing may be kept during the months the products will be a great degree of care is necessary in mixing the solutions.

Exhibits of Coos and Curry counties shown together at the Exposition \$5000 is the amount to be for exhibition purposes. Of

this amount Curry county will donate one-fourth. This money will pay for the services of an expert who will find out the best of all exhibits, will prepare them and who will eventually have them arranged in the Oregon building.

All over the county Mr. Ward has men on the lookout for products that will look well in the exhibit. Not only does he want agricultural products, but a greater emphasis will be placed on the wood and dairy exhibits, on the mineral products and as well, what southwest Oregon has in the way of sea foods.

Formaldehyde is used as a basis in the preservative and glycerine is introduced to bring the solution to about the same density as canning syrup. Fruit or vegetables that are very ripe are unable to stand the liquid and burst. It is for this reason that Mr. Ward is extremely anxious to get all the products while they are in good condition.

Root products he expects to keep through the winter in dry sand and shavings. The boxes to be sent south next week contain several varieties of apples. When taken from cold storage they will last but a few days and for this reason only part of the apples will be taken out for exhibition at one time and only one layer in a box will be shown. With this system it will be possible to exhibit Coos county apples for several weeks.

During the winter Mr. Ward will be kept busy scurrying over the two counties getting together his other exhibits.

George Small, After Passing Bad Checks on Coos Bay, Works Bandon Merchant.

Still in a hurry to get rich quick, George Small, the man who passed several bad checks on Coos Bay a few days ago, has turned up in Bandon, where he cashed a bogus check for \$19.65 and got away with several days' head start of the officers for the reason that the merchant who took the paper was slow in banking the check.

Small passed a check on the Twin City Lumber Company which was detected and turned down at the bank after being presented by the Eagle Bar. At the time it was intimated two other concerns on the Bay had been buncoed by the same man.

In a clever manner Small made himself known to Manager Carpenter of the Racket Store in Bandon. Appearing there a month ago, dressed in old clothes, Small bought some socks, stating that he was on his way to work in the woods and expected to return and pay for the purchase as soon as his check was received.

Consequently Small disappeared for a month. It is thought that during this time he worked his game on Coos Bay. Returning to Bandon a few days ago, Small, still dressed as

though fresh from the woods, presented a check for \$19.65 drawn on the Bank of Bandon and signed by F. L. Christie. With the exception of three dollars taken out for small purchases the money was handed over to the forger, who immediately disappeared and now the officers are without a clue as to the whereabouts of the man who signed himself as George Small.

BIG BULL SNAKE.

Reptile Over Six Feet Long Killed on Coos River.

Dr. Hayden last night secured a bull snake six feet, four inches long, which he believes to be the largest reptile ever killed in this section. It is known as the Pacific Bull Snake or Yellow Gopher Snake. Dr. Hayden says this is an extra large specimen. It occurs only west of the Sierra Nevada Mountains, the eastern species being much darker in color. It is a harmless snake and should be classed among the useful reptiles as they feed on young mammals injurious to man. This snake has a very loud hiss, the hiss being caused by a small flat cartilage placed in front of the breathing passage. When the snake is angry the mouth is partially opened, the cartilage is raised and the breath is expelled violently against it. A very loud hissing sound is thus produced.

NEW MAIN IS TESTED TODAY COTTON CROP IS GREAT ONE

FIRE PROTECTION MAIN IN NORTH BEND SHOWS EIGHTY POUNDS PRESSURE AND THAT PLEASES RESIDENTS THERE.

Manager Corey, of the Coos Bay Water Company issued the following statement today:

The new fire protection main laid in North Bend from the Porter Addition water tank down McPherson street to a connection with the water system at Virginia street was tested out this morning and worked in first-class shape. The North Bend Fire Department was out and threw water thirty feet over the Winsor building the highest building in the North Bend business section, having 80 pounds pressure at the hydrants. Various people expressed themselves as being very much pleased with the new fire protection afforded by the improvements made by the Coos Bay Water Company and that they do not need an expensive fire engine. The fire pressure will be available at all hydrants from the iron works to the Old Town sawmill.

U. S. DREDGE OREGON MAY LEAVE TOMORROW

Tug Boat From Grays Harbor Expected in This Evening—All Ready for Move

Should the expected tug boat arrive from Grays Harbor this evening, the dredge Oregon will leave tomorrow morning for her trip north, according to the statement this afternoon of Captain Shook who declared that all is in readiness. The pontoons and pipe line apparatus of the dredge will be loaded aboard the Willapa which will arrive in Coos Bay Sunday evening.

For several months the U. S. dredge Oregon has been working here on capital furnished by the Port of Coos Bay through failure to secure a federal appropriation. Operations were discontinued last Saturday and preparations at once made for the removal of the dredge to Grays Harbor though it was known that but little money remained of their appropriation and the belief here is that the harbor of the north secured additional funds from the \$20,000,000 emergency bill passed by Congress to take the place of the Rivers and Harbors bill.

"I, George Washington of Mount Vernon, a citizen of the United States and lately president of the same, do make, ordain and declare this instrument, which is written with my own hand and every page thereof subscribed with my name, to be my last will and testament, revoking all others:

ITEM—To my dearly beloved wife, Martha Washington, I give and bequeath the use, profit and benefit of my whole estate, real and personal, for the term of her natural life.

As I also do my household and kitchen furniture of every sort and kind with the LIQUORS and groceries which may be on hand.

I give and bequeath to the said Lawrence Lewis and Eleanor Parke Lewis his wife, and their heirs, the residue of my Mount Vernon estate—all the land north of the road leading from the ford of Dogue Run to the Gum Spring as described in the device of the other part of the tract to Bushrod Washington until it comes to the stone and three red or Spanish oaks on the knoll—thence with the rectangular line to the back line (between Mr. Mason and me) thence with that line westerly along the new double ditch to Dogue Run, by the tumbling dam of my mill, thence with the said Run to the ford aforementioned to which I add all the land I possess west of said Dogue Run & Dogue Crk. bounded, easterly and southerly thereby, together with the mill, DISTILLERY and all other houses and improvements on the premises making together about two thousand acres be it more or less."

HEALTH ORDINANCE Notice To The Public

Notice is hereby given that the provisions of Ordinance No. 310 of the City of Marshfield will be strictly enforced. The following are excerpts from said Ordinance:

Section 2. Whenever any person residing within the corporate limits of the City of Marshfield shall know there exists within his place of residence, or within his family, any persons afflicted with any contagious, infectious or epidemic disease, he shall immediately notify the Committee on Health, Health Officer or the City Marshal.

Section 4. The disease referred to, in the preceding sections shall include cholera, bubonic plague, yellow fever, typhus fever, typhoid fever, diptheria, smallpox, scarlet fever, measles and such other contagious, infectious and epidemic diseases, as the Committee on Health may from time to time direct.

Section 5. Whenever the Committee on Health, or Health Officer or City Marshal shall be informed of the existence of any of the diseases set out in section four within the corporate limits of the City of Marshfield, it shall be their duty to immediately cause to be raised over the premises, so that it can be seen from the public streets abutting on said premises, a yellow flag in case of smallpox, of cholera, a black flag in case of diptheria, a red flag in case of scarlet fever, yellow fever or typhus fever, a white flag in case of measles, said flags to be at least twelve inches square.

Section 6. The quarantine flag must be allowed to remain such time as the Health Officer may designate, prescribe or deem necessary and it shall be unlawful for any person to remove, cover up or in any way interfere with said flag without permission from the Committee on Health or the Health Officer.

Section 22. That any person who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or refuses to comply with or resist any of the provisions of this Ordinance or refuses or neglects to obey any of the rules, orders, proclamations, or sanitary regulations of the Committee on Health, Health Officer or City Marshal, or who omits, neglects or refuses to comply with, or who resists any officer or orders, or special regulations of said Committee on Health and City Marshal, shall upon conviction be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred Dollars, or by being confined in the City Jail for any term not exceeding fifty days, or by both fine and imprisonment, and each day that such violation, failure or neglect shall continue shall be a separate and distinct offense.
