ment at State Fair

Beaming with delight, glad to get back and enthusiastic in their praise of the treatment they received everywhere they visited, the Coos Bay Concert Band arrived home from the north this afternoon, having ended their week's engagement at the State Fair in Salem on Saturday night.

Arriving in Portland, the men were given a luncheon by the Chamber of Commerce, after which the band gave a special concert at the Portland Hotel, and for the trip to the state capital the men traveled in a special car. One of the main attractions of the great fair was the Coos Bay band and through the week the musicians were well complimented for their work and not a little credit was brought to Coos Bay through the representation of the band.

About the grounds on the first day of the fair were circulated cards bearing the program for the day, and on these were printed the picture of the band, this being the main feature of the day.

J. H. Booth, President of the Oregon State Fair board, last Friday sent to Mayor Allen a telegram in which he said: "In behalf of the State Fair Board, I congratulate you and the Coos Bay citizens on the excellency of your concert band. BAD CHECK
ARTIST HELDOfficer Doane Secures Man
Supposed to Have Passed
Three Bogus Checks

When George Cummins sought to make a whole lot of money in the least space of time, it is believed that he undertook to pass several forged checks, not only on Coos Bay, but in Bandon as well. He allowed his successes to get the better of him and returned to his first scene of operation, where he was caught at 1 a. m. Sunday by Officer J. C. Doane, who immediately turned the man over to Officer Robert Emery of North Bend, where Cummins is wanted for passing a check Saturday evening.

Cummins, or Small, as his checks have sometimes been endorsed, engaged a room in the Rogers Rooming House and attracted by the description of the man and suspicious because of the man's actions, Officer Doane immediately took the man in tow.

On September 22 Small entered the Eagle Saloon and passed a check for \$10 drawn on the Twin City Lumber Company. The check was refused at the bank, but Carl J. Small, as the man signed himself, had fled. Less than ten days ago a man answering the description of Cummins entered the Racket Store in Bandon and tendered a check for \$19.65 in payment for a small bill of goods. It was signed George Small, and the officers strongly believe that Cummins is the man who cashed the three bogus checks.

Saturday night, Wm. Schrock, of the Eldorado Saloon in North Bend cashed a check for \$19.40 and the description of the man was then given the local officers and search instituted.

POT SHOOTING
MEXICAN WARCarranza Forces Report Loss
of Six Men—Attack Ex-
pected on Naco

NACO, Oct. 5.—Pot shooting by both sides today opened the third day of the battle of Naco. General Maytorena's forces so far have made no progress. General Hill, commanding the Carranza garrison, reported his losses as six killed and eight wounded. Hill's scouts today reported that Maytorena was disposing his troops in a manner indicating his intention to attack the town from the front. Private Wilson, Troop G, Tenth United States Cavalry, was wounded by a stray Mexican bullet yesterday. He was taken to Huachuca today. The wound is not serious.

EXTRA SESSION
NOT PROBABLEOnly Emergency Would Call
Extra Session, Is Declara-
tion of President

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—Outlining the legislative program for the remainder of the present session of Congress, President Wilson told callers today that no extra session in November is being contemplated. He added that only some extraordinary emergency would necessitate the extra session following the adjournment of the short session in March.

The President said the war tax, the Clayton anti-trust bill and the Alaska coal leasing bill would complete the important work for the present session. For the next session the program outlined by the President will include the Alexander ship purchase bill, the Philippine bill, the general leasing bill, the general land bill, the general dam bill and the usual appropriation bill.

He plans, just as soon as he can secure a good building, to put in a mine, modern market, including a cold storage plant, etc. He is also figuring on enlarging it and combining the grocery and vegetable and fruit business with the meat business, the same as they do in many of the cities.
