WRECK NEAR BANDON

Wreck Has Been Floating About for Some Time BANDON, Or., Oct. 6.—With all means of identification gone, her single mast snapped off close to the deck and with the general appearance of having been wrecked, the hull of a ship, between 70 and 80 feet long, washed ashore about three miles south of here Thursday. From the build and size of the vessel she appears to have been a fishing boat or tender of some sort, and was evidently been drifting about for several months, as she is heavily water logged. Some say that she is the type of boat used for fishing along the Alaskan Coast.

NEW COUNTY MAY RISE

Petitioners Would Create "Stuslaw" From Lane. EUGENE, Or., Oct. 6.—Petitioners asking for information of "Stuslaw" County, taking 800 square miles of the timbered and Coast territory from Western Lane County were filed with the Lane County Clerk bearing sufficient names to place the issue upon the November ballot.

The proposed county will embrace virtually all the territory in Lane County west of the Coast mountains and will be 40 miles long by 30 miles wide. Its assessed valuation is approximately \$5,000,000 and its population is estimated at 2000.

It will include, near its eastern boundary, the towns of Blachley, Hale, Walton and Alma. The line runs between Long Tom, Richardson, Chesire, Spencer and Coyote precincts on the east and Lane, Walton, and Mound on the west. Mound precinct is partly divided by the line.

Something over half of the fish are Silversides, the rest being Chinooks. In a haul made last Saturday, the lower seine caught a Chinook that weighed 54 pounds. This fish caught in the spring, when fat, would have weighed from 60 to 70 pounds.—Port Orford Tribune.
