Brother Dead.--W. J. Rust has received word of the death of his brother, Charles Rust, at Sacramento. He was five years younger than Mr. Rust and suffered from heart trouble.

Heard Debate.--A good-sized audience heard the debate between Rev. Sellock and Col. Hofer at the Masonic Opera House Saturday night. There was no decision and the decision of individuals in the audience seemed to be in accordance with the sentiments they held before the debate started.

For Road Repairs.--Capt. Dunson of the Cape Arago lighthouse has raised about \$500 by public subscription for repairing the road from North Bend to the lighthouse. He expects to put the matter before the county commissioners at Coquille today or tomorrow in an endeavor to have them appropriate a similar amount for repairing the roadway.

Mounts Horns.--Cal Wright yesterday received a handsomely mounted set of spike buck horns. The horns were probably the largest spikes that were ever seen here. Mr. Wright had C. Lokdam, of North Bend, who is an expert in myrtle work and put in a lot of fine myrtle fixtures in Will Schrock's place at North Bend, mount them on a fine myrtle shield as a souvenir.

Not Good Sailors.--With their decks cleared for action, T. H. Marston and Frank Albatone sallied forth under the glare of the lights on the "great white way" Saturday evening. Both shipped heavy seas, the schooners were heaved about in the surging billows and unable to navigate, the men were taken in tow by the police officers and placed in the city's harbor of refuge. They told their stories to the judge and received their fines and departed on their way bound for sober reflection.

Scared Passengers--Passengers on the Nann Smith were quite badly frightened while crossing in over the bar yesterday when a big wave broke over the stern of the boat. It did not do any damage, Capt. Magee says.

Before Police Judge.--Still another wing of the Army of the Unnavigable launched themselves into the office of Police Judge Butler this morning and received an overwhelming defeat. T. M. Marston, appearing for the second time this week on the charge of being drunk, paid an indemnity of \$10. Alex Berg and Alex Lean, resembling each other only in the front names, were also told to pay their indemnity. James Perry and Jack O'Keefe, picked up in the midst of a battle early this morning each was ordered to pay a war revenue tax and hurry on his way.

King in Trouble.--George W. King, the Marshfield butcher, and Acting Chief of Police Will Anderson of North Bend had a lively session yesterday in which Anderson used his club after King became abusive. It is claimed. It seems that a bunch of hogs got out of King's slaughter yard and damaged the garden of Frank Hans, who had the hogs put in the city pound. John Hakanson, who hauled the hogs to the pound, first told King he could have the hogs for fifty cents a head and \$3 for hauling, when the charge should have been \$1 a head. Finally King paid the costs.

Family Asks Support.--Claiming that her husband will pay nothing for the support of herself or her 18-month-old baby, Mrs. Ezra Kinney, of North Bend, this morning asked for a warrant arresting her husband, stating that he has for some time failed to give any money to his family "without just and sufficient cause." Kinney was commanded by Judge Pennock of the justice court to give bond for his appearance at the trial, which will be set for some time this week. Kinney is an employee of the Julius Larson Dredging company and his wife claims that he receives a salary of \$75 per month.

Smith Boy Not Out.--That several complaints have been received in his neighborhood that both his little boy, who is sick with scarlet fever, and a neighbor's girl, have been seen in the street playing together, Gordon Smith declared this morning that the boy is not yet able to sit up and could not possibly have been out of the house. He wants to quiet a rumor which has spread around in regard to the sickness. The boy will be confined in the house for at least two weeks yet. Mr. Smith was able to get out by undergoing a special course of "sprouts" and fumigations called for by the doctor and is now living away from home until the sickness is over.

Former Marshfield Man Charged with Passing Worthless Check.

Geo. N. Farrin, a former Marshfield man who moved to Portland some time ago, is getting in the limelight considerable. The other day he took too big a dose of medicine and almost died and now he is defendant in a rather sensational suit concerning which a Portland paper says:

"A complaint signed by Jacob Hahn was filed in the district court against George N. Farrin, candidate at the primaries for the Republican nomination for attorney general, charging him with passing a worthless check for \$30 on Hahn. Hahn alleges that Farrin secured cash on the check, which was drawn on the Security Savings & Trust Co. bank and that there was no money in Farrin's name in the bank to cover the check. The check was cashed August 22. A warrant for Farrin's arrest was turned over to City Detective Price for service."
