NO LOWERING OF TAXES.

County Board of Equalization Closes Session—Very Few Reductions.
The plea of the Southern Pacific company that their motor line between here and North Bend pays no profit failed to convince the county board of equalization that there should be a tax reduction on the property. Already there has been a 20 per cent reduction in taxes for property owners of Marshfield whose possessions join Front street north of Central avenue, on the grounds that the street railway has reduced the rental capacity of their property.

Asking a 25 per cent reduction in the taxation on timber lands in this county, the Coos Bay Tax Association and the Weyerhaeuser company petitioned the board, declaring their plea was justified on the ground that for the past two years the timber market has been below what it was previous to that time. The board failed to make any reduction.

In ranges 9, 10 and 11 the equalization board made a reduction of 15 per cent on the taxes, which brings the amount to a level with the assessed valuation of last year. This was made because the county assessor had made only a 10 per cent reduction this year, whereas the year before there had been a 25 per cent lowering and the board merely made the assessment back to where it had been previously.

ROAD RECONSTRUCTION NEAR COMPLETION TO INSPECT IT

Rock Creek and Big Creek Roads Being Improved and Bridge Across Middle Fork.

The three county commissioners, with Judge John Hall and P. M. Hall-Lewis, county roadmaster, will go Monday morning to inspect the improvements being made on the Big Creek and the Rock Creek roads, now nearing completion. In addition to this work there is a bridge being erected across the middle fork near the McMullen place. This work is being done by Honnell & Hilstrom, contractors.

Along Rock Creek at least one and one-half miles of the thoroughfare has been reconstructed. For some time men have been at work here with teams and scraper putting it in good condition. The Big Creek road has undergone improvement for a distance of about three-quarters of a mile.
