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## GERMANS STILL ENDEAVOR TO CRUSH RIGHT WING OF ALLIES

Cooperate Attempts Being Made by Kaiser's Forces to Overwhelm French and English in Old French Province of Picardy Today.

**ATTLE NEWS GIVEN OUT TO INDICATE COURSE OF BATTLE IN THAT POSITION**

British and Belgian Troops March East From Ostend to Meet Advance of Germans From Antwerp—But Few Particulars Are Given

LONDON, Oct. 14.—Attempts of the Germans to crush the right wing of the allies in the old French province of Picardy continues, with little to indicate the course of the battle. Of scarcely less importance and with the same ultimate object in view is the struggle of the Germans from Antwerp to reach the coast. Nothing definite of this situation is revealed. A dispatch from Ostend says only a Belgian and British remain in Ostend, indicating that allied armies have gone east to meet the Germans, who are marching on Ostend in large numbers from Ghent. A Petrograd dispatch says it is believed that a great battle between Russian and Austro-German forces is being waged along the Vistula River.

## GERMAN AEROPLANES CONTINUE TO DROP BOMBS IN FRANCE

NANCY, Oct. 14.—Three bombs from German aeroplanes fell yesterday in a railway station in the southern part of the city. The bombs struck a passenger coach, cut the telegraph wires and wounded three persons.

## RUSSIANS CAPTURE A ZEPPELIN

PETROGRAD, Oct. 14.—A patrol of Cossacks, while hidden in a forest near Warsaw, brought down a Zeppelin. The crew of the airship was saved. The ship itself is not damaged and is interned at Warsaw.

## AUSTRIANS MAKE FINAL EFFORT TO CRUSH SERBIA WITH BIG ARMY

VIENNA, Oct. 14.—Austria has concentrated on the banks of the Drina the greatest army yet sent against Serbia in the final and supreme effort to crush this country. Fierce fighting already has been reported between the outposts and a big battle is said to be imminent.

## JAPAN PLANS TO BOMBARD TSING TAU NEXT SATURDAY

PEKING, Oct. 14.—According to advices reaching here from Tsing Tau arrangements have been made for the removal from that city of American Consul Peck and ten other non-combatants. The transfer of these people to the Japanese will be made tomorrow under a white flag. It is understood that the bombardment of Tsing Tau by the Japanese will begin Saturday.

## FRENCH HONOR BELGIANS

LONDON, Oct. 14.—A dispatch from Havre says the members of the Belgian government arrived in Havre last night and were received by Minister of Marine and local authorities. Military honors were rendered the Belgians and the populace gave them an enthusiastic reception.

## ARIZONA GOVERNOR AND WAR DEPARTMENT CLASH OVER MEXICO

Sec. Garrison Requests Gov. Hunt Not to Send National Guard to Naco or Douglas—Additional U. S. Troops Sent to Douglas Today.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 14. (By Courier to Vera Cruz).—The seizure of the Mexico Tramway Company's lines by the Carranza government was made Monday at the point of the bayonet. The government explained that the measure was a provisional one, taken in the interest of the public welfare and due to the stoppage of street car traffic Thursday when the tramway employees struck for higher wages and shorter hours.

## INDIANS PLAN RAID

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14.—Secretary Garrison today telegraphed Governor Hunt of Arizona that the dispatch of the state militia to Naco or Douglas as proposed by the Governor would greatly complicate the situation at those places, and that the United States forces there are doing everything that should be done to protect American lives and property short of actually invading Mexico. He earnestly advised Governor Hunt to use his influence to prevent Arizona citizens from exposing themselves to danger.

## GERMANS PLAN TO LAY SIEGE TO BELFORT WITH LARGE FORCE

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 14.—According to a Berlin dispatch, the Germans are preparing to lay siege to Belfort with as large a force as possible. Almost the entire civil population has left the city. In the Franco-Prussian war Belfort withstood a siege of more than three months.

## MEDICINE GETS FIND BODY OFF FREE THIS MORNING

Senate Democrats Knock It Out—Newspapers Must Pay on Shipments.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14.—The proposed taxation of proprietary medicines in the war revenue bill order was stricken out by Democrats of the Senate finance committee. Members of the House ways and means committee had given notice the House would not agree to a tax on "poor man's medicine." The committee also accepted an amendment to the proposed tax on shipments of newspapers. The amendment fixes a tax of one cent on each shipment of papers. Shipments made within the county of publication are exempted from the tax.

## RELIGIOUS BOY HIT BY BOMB

New York Priest Hurt and St. Patrick's Cathedral Damaged by Insane Person

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—From bits of iron picked up in both St. Patrick's Cathedral and in the yard of St. Alphonsus rectory, the police believe that the bombs exploded yesterday afternoon and early today are the work of the same person or persons. That the bomb was placed in the cathedral by a demented person was the opinion of Monsignor Laville. The explosion rendered a boy kneeling in prayer thirty feet away unconscious. The bomb in the archedway at St. Alphonsus slightly injured a priest.

## SHOW WOMAN IS MURDERESS

Ruth McCullough and Clarence McCormick, of Hedrick, Iowa, Under Arrest

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—Ruth McCullough, a 20-year-old snake charmer, and her companion, Clarence McCormick, 18, son of a Hedrick, Iowa farmer, were arrested here today charged with the recent murder of I. W. Mollatt, a wealthy farmer. The police say the couple have confessed. The motive was robbery. Mollatt was shot while in his automobile and his head crushed.

## MILITIA AND ARMY CLASH

Col. Hatfield Announces That He Will Keep Arizona National Guard Back

NACO, Oct. 14.—When informed that Governor Hunt had ordered the Arizona state militia to be prepared to proceed to Naco, Colonel Hatfield, commanding the United States Cavalry Brigade on border duty, said he would keep the militiamen out of the danger zone the same as any other non-resident civilians. There was no fighting last night or early today between the attacking forces of Governor Maytorena and the Carranza garrison.

## FEAR LAUNCH LOST AT SEA

Ten Mile Friends of Messrs. Van Burger and Sprague Worried.

THREE IN BOAT.  
Today it was reported that three went out in the missing boat. James Cowan was to have gone but could not and Messrs. Sprague and Van Burger were to go alone, but they may have picked up a third man. They secured the boat from John Swing.

Steam schooners and other vessels along the coast have been asked to keep watch for a small gasoline fishing boat in which Messrs. Van Burger and Sprague of Ten Mile started from here for Gardiner last Friday. Since they went out over the bar here, nothing has been heard from them and great apprehension is felt for them.

Messrs. Van Burger, Sprague, Cowan and others at Ten Mile figured that with a good launch to carry the salmon from the mouth of Ten Mile Creek to the cannery at Gardiner they could make a good profit out of the salmon run there this fall. So last Friday, Messrs. Sprague and Van Burger started out for Gardiner, following the tug Glenner, which was returning to Gardiner from here. At the time the bar and ocean were smooth.

What is become of the little launch since then is a mystery of the sea. Whether the gasoline engine got into trouble, whether they lost their course, or whether they encountered a choppy sea is not known.

During the last few days the sea has been very rough and it would be difficult for the launch to weather it.

Today wireless messages were sent out to all the vessels along the coast that could be reached asking them to keep on the lookout for the missing launch. Telephone messages to nearby points failed to bring any word of them and relatives of the two men are greatly alarmed.

## FRENCH REPORT BATTLES IN BELGIUM DURING LAST FEW DAYS

Says That Most Severe Encounters Lately Were in Belgian Field of Operations Where Allies Have Occupied Town of Ypres.

**CLAIM THAT LATER ADVICES CONFIRM REPORTS OF VICTORIES ALONG CENTER OF LINE**

On Left Wing, Conditions Are Reported Developing Normally While on the Right Wing Nothing New is Given Out Concerning Operations.

PARIS, Oct. 14.—The following official announcement was issued this afternoon: "In the Belgian field of operations, there were some encounters during the night of October 12, 13 and during the day of the 13th in the region around Ghent. French and English troops have occupied Ypres. On our left wing, as far as the Oise River, operations are developing normally. On the center previous reports of the progress of our armies in the region of Berry-au-Sac is confirmed. On our right wing there is nothing new."

## TWO NOTED FRENCH GENERALS (KILLED IN RECENT BATTLES

PARIS, Oct. 14.—News was received today of the death of General Rondony, commander of the third brigade of the French Colonial infantry, who was killed while leading a brigade against the enemy. Two English women nurses were killed by the exploding of a shell in a field hospital.

## GERMANS LEAVE PORTUGAL AND PLANS MADE FOR MOBILIZATION

LONDON, Oct. 14.—Cabling from Lisbon, the correspondent of the Central News says it is reported that the German Minister to Portugal and other Germans residing in Lisbon are about to leave for Madrid. As a result of cabinet meetings and conferences between leaders of the various Portuguese parties and President of the republic it has been resolved to convoke Congress on October 16 to pass on a vote for the mobilization of the Portuguese troops.

## WAR NOT DECLARED YET

LONDON, Oct. 14.—Portugal has not yet declared war on Germany, it was learned officially tonight, but a partial mobilization of the Portuguese troops will be ordered tomorrow.

## AUSTRIANS ANNOUNCE RUSSIANS HAVE EVACUATED LEMBERG

## BIG GERMAN FORCE AT GHENT
