CHARLES BOONE LIMB'S VICTIM

Well-known Young Man Killed in Lawhorne's Logging Camp at McKinley

Chas. Boone, aged 23, and a son of T. M. Boone, a well known rancher between Sumner and Fairview, was killed yesterday in an accident in the Lawhorne logging camp at McKinley. He was struck by a decaying limb which fell from a tree which they were felling, his skull being crushed by the fall. He lived for about five hours.

Boone was related to Mike Boone of Sumner and Engineer James Boone of the Smith-Powers line beyond Myrtle Point. Boone had been employed at the camp for some time and the accident caused much grief among his many friends. Burial will be at Sumner.

Dr. Morrow and Will Chandler have consented to act as coaches and will report at the first practice of the men, which will be held a week from tomorrow on the depot grounds about 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

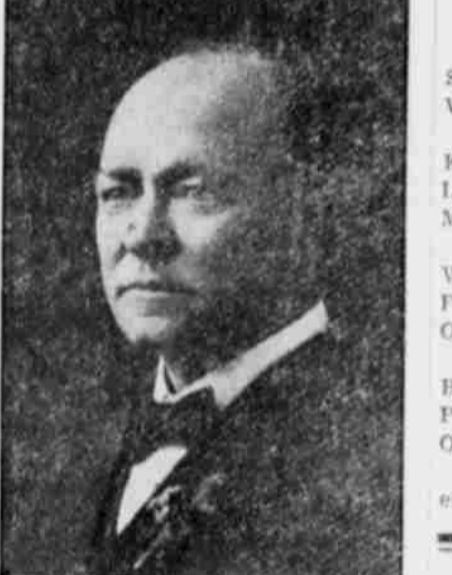
Several times during the weeks to follow signal practice has been arranged for, possibly on some of the vacant sand lots close in, where all may attend without much trouble.

STR. ELDER IN THIS MORNING

Waited Outside Bar Since Nine O'Clock Last Evening—Very Few Seaside

Waiting outside the bar since last night at 9 o'clock, the George W. Elder crossed in at 10 o'clock this morning from Eureka after a trip which held them bar-bound outside the Eureka bar for more than fifty hours. The Elder will not leave until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, for with the heavy southwest sea breaking on the bar the captain declares it is impossible to leave except with a high tide.

Leaving Coos Bay last Tuesday evening the Elder arrived at Eureka and found the seas on the bar breaking too high to safely cross in. Anchor was dropped and the passengers entertained themselves playing cards and the officers declare that they enjoyed the experience and that very few were seasick. The ship tossed but little in the long sea swell.

On the way up the Bay this morning the Breakwater, outward bound for Portland, was sighted at Empire. As soon as the Elder crossed in, Capt. Macgown immediately got to sea, then having high tide in his favor.
